

mour-The Body Found in the Monongabela River-Arrest and Committal of the Accused

BFILEVERNON, April 24 .- A dead body was found floating in the Monongabela river at this place this moraing, which was identified as the body of James Housman, who disappeared so mysteriously on the 3d instant, A post mort:m examination revealed a gunshot wound in the head, the bullet having gone entirely through the head. A rope was also found around his neck, to which evidently, had been attached an anchor to suk and hold the body. The Coroner's jury verdict was that the deceased came to his death by being shot through the head, on tae 3d of April, by Richard Thairwell and Mary Housman, wife of the doceased. They were committed to the county jail for a further hear

Housman, the decensed, was engaged in the sand business, and on rising from his bod on the morning of the 3d, he told his wife to get trenktisst roady, while he went do vn to the river to look after his sand boats. Richard Thairwell, who was in Housman's employ, boarded with him. From the time Housman left his residence in the morning, nothing was known of him until the recovery of his body as above. His wife and Thairwell, whose intimacy was such as to attract public notice, were sus-pected by the elitzens of having marchered him, and thrown his body into the river, and they were pleced ander surveiliance. Mrs. Housman gave out that her husband was subject to fits, and stated a theory that he was seized with a fit uplie on his boats, and tell into the river and sended a theory that he was select with a fit while on his boats, and fell into the river and was drawned. From the foregoing facts it will be even that floatman was first mur-dered, and his body then sunk in the river, with an auchor attached, to prevent its coming to the partner until that recognition. - Pittsburg Commerce. Wreck of a Cotton Steamer off Augusta,
