THE NEW TARIFF BILL The bill to amend the Internal Revenue act,

as reported to us, provides as follows:-Distillers shall pay a tax or \$100, instead of premising to pay \$50. This additional sum allows the additional privileges for their liquors or cus-



"DRUNK ON THE PREMISES," Distillers of apples, sour grapes, and acorns, of not more than 150 barrels of pure brandy therefrom per annum, to pay but \$50; but not to be drunk on the premises. Affairs between Austria and Prussia are without change. There is a report that to supply [Reading Railroad and Branches, the necessary change they intend issuing a lot of postal currency. Several eminent business men have already submitted propositions to have their portraits engraved upon it, or a view "t efore and after taking it."

The Schleswig-Holstein question is settled, so the telegraph reports say, into a regular quarrel. The debate on the Reform bill commenced in the House of Common last night, the object is presumed to be to get 5 per cent, taken off the bill for cash, but as none of the members knew the exact amount of the bill, they came to no conclusion.

Mr. Gladstone moved the bili, and put it on the passage. It is feared that some of the members coming into the House of a dark day may not see it, and stumble over it. They have stumbled over several previous bills already.

There is quite a panic in the Stock Exchange. Shares of a majority of the companies have been held by weak holders, consequently have had a fall. 
