ASSASSINATION OF MR. LINCOLN.

Letter from a Man who Knows All About It-Who Stood Within Ten Feet of the President when he was Killed Three Persons in Louisiama who Know All About It—The Pretended Assassin King—Some of Bis Antecedents—His Object in Implicating Himself—Alleged Falsity of his Story.

MONTGOMERY, Ala., April 18, 1886,-I have seen MONTGOMERY, Als., April 18, 1866.—I have seen lately an account taken from one of the Louisville papers (the Democrat, I think), of one Sterling King, who pretends to be the man who killed Abraham Lincoln It is but right that every one should know who this man King is, and judge him accordingly. He was en ployed by the United States Government as a detective, or special agent, as they style themselves, in 1861. He was the man who searched the greater portion of Morgan's men who were sent to Camp Douglas, and in searching them, relieved them of any superfluous valuables they chanced to have retained until them, and appropriated them to himself. Many of the Camp Douglas. priated them to himself. Many of the Camp Douglas prisoners may remember the long-legged, sandy-haired devil who was so untiring in taunting them as they entered their Northern prison. He had one or two teeth out in front In 1863-64 he operated in aud around Cincinnati. Sam'l homas, the tailor, Catneart, the schoolmaster, and Mrs. Parmenter, the washerwo o, those terrible conspirators who were to have sted the escape of General John H. Morgan and all the prisoners then confined in Camp Chase, all know him well. He passed himself generally there as a Reboi or Confederate spy. Not being able to find out anything about the escape of General Morgan in Cincinnati, he thought to "beard the iton in his den'"—the Morgan in his camp—and went to the General's heacquarters in Western Virginia with some very pretty and plausible stories from the Kentucky Rebess, trying to gain the General's confidence; but he was not very successful, for he was recognized by some of his former victums of Camp Douglass. He was arrested and tried as a spy by a came of him after that I do not know. Perhaps some of General Morgan's staff officers could tell. What his object is in saying that he is the slaver of Lincoln, I caunot tell, unless it be to make some further statements to engage the Northern records against Mr. Days. people against Mr. Davis. Of course his confes-sion criminates himself, but then nothing would be easier for his friends, whom I doubt not are high in power, than to effect his escape and give him a nice round sum wherewith to hve the rest of his days in some foreign land. All that he is undertaking bodes no good to some one. He was ar-rested in Kentucky for horse-stealing, and gives as his reason for making his confession, that there are parties in Washington who knew of the part he had taken in the assassination, and that on seeing his name in the papers, he would be immediately sent for from there. Now, if that were the case, he cortainly would not have gives in his right name when tainly would not have given in his right name when taken to Louisville, and then those parties in Washington would never have known anything of so important a personage. Next, had he intended to bleed himself to d ath, as the papers say he attempted, he could have done it very easily No! he merely wished to give an appearance of truthfulness to his statement. And now, the last and best reason that I have for knowing that it is all false, is, that I happen to know every one connected with the killing of Mr Lincoln—was there at the time, the killing of Mr Lincoln—was there at the time, within ten feet of the private box, and know that neither Sterling King nor Jefferson Davis had anything to do with nor knew of it until after the deed. This you take for just what you think it worth; but publish this, and let o hers do the same. Its publication can certainly do no one any harm. There are three persons in the State or Louisana who could, if they chose, testify to the truth or all I say here. Why I do not fix a signature to this, you can well imagine.

Why Letters Fail of their Destination. The Albany Journal of Thursday has an inter-

esting article upon the subject of "missing let-ters," which we subjoin. It should be premised that the editor speaks from knowledge from his official position in the Post Office of that city:—"Whenever letters are missed, the fault is charged upon the Post Office. But in nine cases out of ten, it lies with the parties sending the letters. Take a few examples:-"A short time since a Government officer in this city was notified that two letters had been sent to him, one containing a check for eighty thousand dollars, and the other for thirty thousand dollars. He was, of course, in great tribulation, and sup posed the definquency to be in the post office. But the letters had been directed to the city of New

York, instead of Albany, and were discovered in the advertised list, and secured, all right.

"A day or two since a gentleman in Syracuse notified Mr. Roessle, of the Delevan House, that he had iorwarded him \$8500 to take up a note But no such letter cane to hand. Search was instituted and inquiries made, but the letter could not be found. It as finally discovered in the office at Syracuse, held

for postage.
"One of our citizens put a thousand dollar draft in a letter directed to Buffalo, a lew days ago. It did not reach its destination, and the post office was duly anathematized; when, lo! the letter turned up among those held for postage.
"A twenty thousand dollar check was, the writer

"A twenty thousand dollar check was, the writer supposed, sent to lilnois, but it did not reach its destination. In due time it was returned to nim from the dead-letter office. It had been directed to Michigan instead of Illinois.

"Three members of a family in this city own stock in a Western bank. One of them received the regular dividend, but the others did not. After a while it was found that the two missing letters had been directed to New York instead of Albany.

"Instances like these are occurring every day. The I ost Office Department is, of course, held responsible—censu ed when the letters are missed, but not relieved from the cen-ure when the delinquencies are found to belong to the parties themselves. For no one likes to talk about his own blunders.

blunders.

"The chief causes of missing letters are—first, misdirection; and, secondly, newlect to stamp them properly. Of the latter, there have been deposited at the office in this city, since the first of January, seven hundred and seventy-four. Except in cases where the writers are known (by having their card

upon the envelope), these are sent to the dead-lette "It should be known that a revenue stamp is not recognized on a letter; and a great many letters are deposited with such stamps upon them. These are all sent to the dead-letter office."
