Mr. Hodsdon, from the Committee to verify the eash accounts of the City Treasurer, reported the following as the statement of the accounts up to May 1:—Cash balance on hand, \$1,096,636.66; trust funds, \$39,567.30. Mr. Wagner, from the Committee on Law,

reported in favor of the ordinance authorizing the deposit of United States, State of Pennsylvania, or city securities, instead of real estate, as security for heads of departments, the parties making the deposit to receive the accruing interest. The bill was postponed.

Mr. Van Cleve introduced an ordinance re-

quiring every passenger railway company to place guards around the wheels, in order to prevent accidents. A penalty of \$50 is affixed for non-compliance with the ordinance. Before any plan is adopted by the railroad company it is to be submitted to a special committee in Conseils. Postgored Councils. Postponed.

act of Assembly dividing the Twenty-fourth Ward into two wards, and creating an additional ward, to be called the Twenty-seventh Ward, Mr. Cattell submitted in connection with this act two ordinances dividing the Twenty-fourth and Twenty-seventh Wards into election dis

Mr. Spering, from the Committee on City Pro-perty, to which was referred the communication of J. Ross Snowden. Prothonotary of the Supreme Court, asking to be furnished with a fre-proof, reported against granting the request. committe state that the court officers are a source of expense to the city, while the emolu-ments of the office go into the pockets of the in-cumbents or into the treasury of the State. It is suggested that the emoluments are sufficient to warrant the officers in furnishing the office. The committee ask to be discharged from the

further consideration of the subject. Adopted. The ordinance providing for the public health and cleanliness, under consideration at the last stated meeting, was again taken up on third reading. A debate on the general features of the bill ensued. Objection was made to the section which requires connection to be made with sewers in cases of the overflow of gutters to houses already erected. In answer to this, it was urged by the friends of the bill that it applied only to cases where there was an excessive low of water over the pavement.

The ordinance from Common Council changing the site of the new Court House was concurred in. Adjourned.

In Common Council, a communication was irteenth and Fitteenth Freets Passenger Railroad Company, stating that the said Company have the right under the charter to lay out and construct a passenger railway, with a double track, on Broad street, and the convenience of the travelling public requires additional rallway accommodation north of Columbia avenue, which can be as well given by a single track on Broad street, as by a double track, provided the said Company be permitted to extend their track upon Thirteenth street from Columbia avenue to Diamond street, and on Diamond street from Thirteenth to Broad street; that the said Company have also the right to lay a double track on Spring Garden st eet west from Broad street; and a connection from Broad to Thirteenth street would avoid the necessity of laying a track upon Broad street south of Spring Garden street.

That a resolution was passed by City Councils requiring said Company to take up and remove their tracks upon Twenty-fifth street, from Spring Garden street to the Fairmount gate, the right to lay which track is claimed by said Company as incident to their right to run to Fair-

The petition of said Company, therefore, respectfully asks leave to lay down tracks upon streets hereby designated. Referred to the Committee on Railroads.

Mr. Billington reported an ordinance appropriating \$6100 to pay for repairs to the 2d. 10th. 11th, 12th, 15th, and 16th District Station Houses. Adopted. Mr. Little, of the Survey Committee, reported

an ordinance fixing the charge for constructing sewers at \$1.25 per lineal loot per frontage.

The same gentleman reported an ordinance fixing its whart line on Windmill Island, so as to extend the east line outh from the canal.

Mr. Griffiths, of the Committee on Trusts and Fire, to whom was reterred the petition of the firemen asking that the State House bell should be rung for fires, reported in favor of granting the request of the pautioners, with an ordinance appropriating \$635.66 to pay the sala-ries of two additional bell-ringers for the State

Mr. Fox moved that the bill be indefinitely postponed. The motion to indefinitely postpone was

agreed to—yeas, 18; nays, 14.

Mr. Hancock, of the Special Committee to whom was reterred the resolution providing for changing the plans and site of the new Court House, reported an ordinance favorable to the change, and providing that the change chall not involve any greater sum than \$8000. Adopted.

UNITED STATES NAVAL HOSPITAL FOR PHILADELPHIA.—The General Government in-tends to build a large and commodious Naval Hospital, on the grounds occupied by the Naval Asylum, on the grounds occupied by the Naval Asylum, on the Gray's Ferry road.
