The retiring room for the Judges will be at the rear, and the entrance for prisoners on the north side, to which the van will be driven through the gate on Chesnut street. The Sixth street front will have a base of granute, thirteen feet high, with pressed brick above. The drawings have been made by Mr. George S. Bethell, architect, and Mr. Colliday will push on the work to an early completion.

AN OLD SEWER .- The workmen, in making excavations yesterday for the joundations of the new marcie building on Wainut street, below fifth came across an old sewer, built on the bed of the main branch of Dock creek. This branca of Dock creek commenced near the Girard Bank, on Third street, and crossed Fourth street and Harmony court and Walnut street at the point indicated by the cuivert rejerred to. It then crossed Fifth street, near Adolphi, and the protections of the content of the point indicated by the cuivert rejerred to. near Adelphi, and thence through Washington Square and under Rev. Mr Barnes' Church to near Spruce street, thence on the north side of Spruce to Ninth street, and then diagonally across to Broad and Chesnut streets, where it ended.
