The affair was an entire surprise, none the less agreeable that the testimonial took the shape of a dinner set of sixteen massive pieces in silver, wrought in the very highest style of the silver-worker's art, Most of those present had been associated with Mr. Franciscus for many years, and the hum-blest of them had learned to love and esteem

him as a considerate friend.

The plate was presented on behalf of the donors by George W. Mehaffy, of Marietta, Pa. It was received by Mr. Franciscus in person, in a brief and modest speech, in which, after expressing his gratitude for so kind a remembrance, he promised to forward to the Committee a more enduring expression of his feelings. NEW SCHOOL-HOUSES .- The Committee on Property of the Board of Control met yesterday afternoon, to consider how and in what manner it would be best to procure suitable plans for new school-houses. With the view of eliciting the views of others, the Committee in-vites the presence of the Committee on Schools of Councils and all the architects of the city. The principal design seemed to be the mode of drawing into fair competition all the skill and talent which Philadelphia can command. The great difficulty which has operated in the past most in uriously has been the risk which each architect ran in having his plan rejected, and thus being at a loss of time, labor, and expense without compensation. To remedy this it is suggested that each architect appointed by the Committee should be paid a certain sum for his plans, which should be the property of the Board - a sum equal to the amount which the same actually cost—and the architect presenting the plan best approved should be the architect of the building. This was the suggestion of Edward Shippen, Esq., who said it had been adopted in the case of the Burd Orphan Asylum, and proved a wise one, and met with the ap-proval of all the architects. The subject of school buildings, it seems, will receive the most careful attention of the Committee on Property, and we are glad to find we have so good a pros pect of school-houses worthy of the name and a credit to the city.

POLICE ITEMS.—Robert Cooper, commonly known as Bob Ridley, had a hearing before Com-missioner Sergeant, charged with dealing in counterfeit money. Sergeant Cameron, of the Thir-teenth Police District, testified that the defendant was arrested at a tavern in this city, and that he had on his person six twenty dollar bills, all counterfeits, on the First National Bank of Portland, Connecticut. He was held in \$2000 for his appearance at Court.

Arthur Held had a hearing at the Central Station yesterday, on the charge of appropriating goods at the store of Theodore Weil & Co., No. 227 South Third street. The accused had been in the employ of the firm as a book-keeper, and after leaving visited the store occasionally. Goods were missed, and it was ascertained that the defendant had taken articles of the same character to another store to be sold. Some of these were recovered and identified. The de-lendant was bound over to answer.

Gustavus Winhold and James Diamond were arrested on the charge of throwing stones at a fire company, by which one of the lamps of the Friendship Fire Company's apparatus was broken. They were held in \$500 to answer.

THE APPRENTICES' LIBRARY .- The annual report of this institution is just issued. It is a small pamphlet, but is nevertheless full of suggestiveness in its every line. The amount of good that it does can never wholly be known. It is remarkable, however, that of its handsome collection of books many that used to be much sought after are now comparatively little read. It is an interesting tact, in this connection, that no book on the shelves is read with so great avidity as "The Life of Abraham Lincoln." During the last year 17,935 volumes have been loaned in the boys' department and 26,836 volumes in the girls' department. The average number using the library each month are 771 boys and 1073 girls. Of new admissions there has been an average of 57 boys and 46 girls. The treasurer's report and a table of statistics for the last year are annexed to this report. There are now on the shelves of the library in the boys' department about 13,500 volumes, and in the girls' department 7000 volumes.

MEETING OF THE HISTORICAL SOCIETY .-The regular quarterly meeting of the Historical Society of Pennsylvania took place at the society's room, corner Sixth and Adelphi streets, last evening. Dr. B. H. Coates, the Vice-President, presided on the occasion. The minutes of the last meeting were read and approved. The amended constitution, as passed at the stated meeting in January, and recorded in the minutes of that meeting, was read as referred to this meeting by the Executive Council, together with amendments thereto passed the Executive Council. Mr. Aubrev H Smith presented and read an amendment to the aforesaid amended constitution. The consideration of this amendment went over until the next quarterly meeting, to be held on the first Monday in August, Mr. Charles W. Morris gave notice that the amendments proposed by the Executive Council would be presented at the

IMPORTANT TO HOUSEKEEPERS,-Chief Ruggles has, under the authority of his Honor Mayor McMichael, issued a public notice that citizens shall not wash their street pavements or cause them to be washed, between the hours of seven o'clock A. M. and seven o'clock P. M. form the control of the contro P. M., from the present time until the 1st of October. The enforcement of this very excelent ordinance will relieve the minds of house keepers in sections of the city most remote from the fountain head, from all apprehension of bursting "water backs" or range boilers.
