It has been in operation but little more than a year, during which time it has found comfortable homes for a number of parentless children. The institution has been liberally sustained by the philanthropic of Camden, and now has twenty children, all that there are room and accommodations for. But the managers have secured the building adjoining the one now occupied, which, when fitted up, will give room for about ten additional occupants. They have also secured a fine lot of ground at Fifth and Plum streets, on which it is contemplated soon to creet a suitable building, with all the necessary arrangements and accommodations for the uses of the institution.
