J. Ross Brown, who has just arrived from Atizona, discredits the telegram which reported Fort Goolwin, Arizona, captured by 2000 Indians, and the garrison murdered. He says the Apaches are the only hostile Indians in the Terpitory, and could not muster 200 men for an attack on Fort Goodwin, which is in a desert tract of country, and is defended by 140 men, abundantly armed.

The President's Approval.

The President has also approved the bill extenging the jurisdiction of the Court of Claims This court can now hear and determine the claim of any paymaster, quartermaster, commissary of subsistence, or other disbursing offi cer of the United States, or of his administra tors or executors, for relief from responsibility on account of losses, by capture or otherwise. while in the line of his duty, of Governmen tunds, vouchers, records, and papers in hi charge, and for which such officer was held responsible, provided, that an appeal may be taken to the Supreme Court, as in other cases; and whenever the court shall have ascertained the facts of such losses to have been without fault or neglect on the part of any such officer, it shall make a decree setting forth the amount thereof, upon which the proper accounting officers of the Treasury shall allow to such officer the amount so decreed, and credit in the settlement of his accounts.

The Indian Troubles in Arizona,

It is evident that the Indians who massacre the garrison at Fort Goodwin are Apachescertainly the most freacherous and blood airsty of all the nomadic races scattered over the vast extent of the Northwestern territories. Since the first incursions of white pioneers into their domains, the Apaches have been troublesome. It cannot justly be said that they have ever been at peace with the whites. During the past three years—since the recovery of Arizona from Confederate hands—appeals to Congress for help have been frequent; but the majority have not thought it expedient to give protection.

There is reason to believe the Apach's have habitants of Utah; for it is known that the booles of disguised Mormons have been found among the stain after a battle with and victory over the Apaches by our troops. Massacres of whites-of individuals, or of parties, generally of emigrants-have been of almost daily eccur-rence. A letter, received in San Francisco on the 22d April, dated at Las Paz, Arizona, April 13, announced fast Major Miller, of the 14th United States Infantry, and four men, wore killed while going from Fort Grant to Tuesan. After the murder a company of Maricopas and Punas went in pursuit of the Apaches, killing twenty-five and capturing others.

Fort Goodwin, at which the recent massacre took place, is about eighty five miles southeast of Las Paz, and eighty miles cast of Arizona City, near Gila river. Its original name (if we remember rightly) was Fort Breckinridge, but it has been renamed in honor of the present Governor of Arizona. The fort was nearly on the line of the (proposed) Southern route of the Pacific Railroad, and was on the direct Southern emigrant route. Prescott, about forty miles north, the capital of Arizona, is a town of coniderable importance, and from its exposed situation there is reason to tear that it may be visited by the Apaches, now doubly excited by their victory at Fort Goodwins.

Among the latest acts of President Lincoln's life was a proclamation warning all persons against furnishing Indians with arms. We reprint the proclamation :--

Whereas, Reliable information has been received that hostile Indians, within the limits of the United States, have been furnished with arms and munistates, have been tormsned with arms and muni-tions of war by persons living within foreign terri-tory, and are therefore enabled to prosecute their savage warfare upon the exposed and sparse settle-ments of the frontier. Now, therefore, be it known that 1, Abraham kincoln, President of the United States of America, do hereby proclaim and direct that all persons engaged in that nefarions traffic, shall be arrested and tried by court master at the shall be arrested and tried by court martial at the nearest military post, and, if convicted, shall receive the pumi-humevt due to their desorts. In witness whereof I have berequite set my hand

At 10 o'clock the anniversary exercises took plane at the Academy, James Lennox, Esq., the President of the Society, presiding, Among hose who occupied seats on the platform were Bishop McIlvaine, Hon. Robert C. Winthrop, Rev. Dr. Spring, Rev. Dr. De Witt, Chancellor Ferris, Major General Howard, and ex-Governor Vroont, of New Jersey. The President briefly addressed the audience, after which the Trea surer's and Secretary's reports were read, being substance as follows:-
