**Devis in June.** FORTRESS MONROE, May 9.—The Grand Jury of the United States Circuit Court met at 10 o'clock this morninglat Norfolk, pursuant to the instruc-tions of Judge Underwood yesterday, and were in session with closed doors all day. As this is the first time this Court has been in session here since the beginning of the war, there will be no closes to be tried until the Grand Jury bring in some bills of indictment. Meantime, the papers and people of Norfolk are a good deal excited over the charge of Judge Underwood. Although in it he ald not make mention of the name of Jeff. Davis or a single Rebel General, his references

it he did not make mention of the name of Jeff. Davis or a single Rebel General, his references to them as deserving candidates for indictment and trial for treason were too clear and pointed to be by any possibility misunderstood. This is a feature of the charge very many do not relish. Another feature of dislike is his style of dealing with the negro question. Re-garding the sessions of the court for trial of treason causes, it is confidently expected that the bill pending in Congress, and already having passed the Senate, calling for its removal to passed the Senate, calling for its removal to Richmond, will pass, and leave these cases to be tried in the latter city. From what I learned to day I feel very well assured that a true oill of indictment will be brought in against Jeff, Davis. I feel further assured that I may prophesy with great certainty that his trial will begin in less than a month from now, that the city of Rich-mond, the great hotbed of treason, where he spent most of the years of the war, and showe the hardest to carry to successful conclusion his the hardest to carry to successful conclusion his treasonable schemes, will be the scene of his trial, and that Chief Justice Chase will pre-side at the trial. The present probability is that the present Grand Jury and Court will accom-plish but very brief work in Norfolk, and that the really important and earnest work to be done will be entered upon on the 6th of next June in Richmond, -X. HELFING REDUCED SAVANS .- Some years age the celebrated erench chemist Thenard founded a society for helping scientific men or their families in reduced circumstances. The Societe de Secours des Amis des Sciences numbers two thousand seven hundred members, and during the last nine years it has distributed a sum of 150,000 francs. It is now proposed to give an-nually a series of loctures, and several eminent professors have volunteered their services. The Empress has given her patronage to the affair, and the lectures are to be delivered by Delanny, M. Fremy, Bertrand and Jamin.

BALLOONING .- A curious apparatus for propel-ling balloons through the air has been devised by Mr. Butler, one of the members of the council of the new Æronautical Society in London. It consists of a pair of wings, operated from the car of the balloon, whose down ward blow is cal-culated to strike with a force exceeding forty force of one thousand cubic feet of carburetted hydrogen. The action required is somewhat similar to that of rowing.

SPECULATIONS IN INDIA.-A recent return of the number of joint-stock companies registered in Calcutta during the year 1865, shows that the nominal capital invested during that period amounted to \$1,658,000 rapees, divided among twenty-tour associations. Eleven companies have been wound up. The shortest-lived specu-lation was the "Northwest of Indua Cotion Screwing Company," which, from its name, could scarcely expect any other mute than that of being "wound up."

CULTIVATION OF THE OYSTER IN ENGLAND .-The subject of encouraging the cultivation of the oyster in English waters is before the House of Commons. A commission appointed for the purpose enumerates the coasts of Kent and Essex, chiefly the estuaries of the Thames, Clew Bay, in Ireland, and portions of the Scottish coast as eligible places for oyster-beds.



IMPROVEMENTS IN BERLIN .- Prussian architect- appointed by the Government are to visit Paris and London, for the purpose of studying the Chamber of Deputies and the Houses of Parliament, with a view to the new houses to be built in Berlin on the site of the Royal Porcelain Magulaciory, The estimates are \$1.125.000.

THE TEST OATU .- Hou. John Hogan, one of the Missouri Congressmen, asserted in a speech at St. Louis, on Thesday night, that he had been informed by one of the Judges of the United States Supreme Court that the Missouri preachers' and lawyers' test oath law was uncon-stitutional. The decision will not be officially made public until next winter.

FIRES IN PETERSBURG .--- At Petersburg, Va., on Monday night last, two churches belonging to the colored people were set on fire and con-sumed, and during the configuration another was discovered on bre, but in time to save the building. The event has caused much excitement in the community.

A NEW GAS-BUBSER. - A new gas-burner has been introduced in Ediuburgh. The nib is composed of "patent adamss," a siliceous sub-stance not liable to corrosion or oxidation; and the result is that the flame is always steady, and the gas theroughly consumed.
