Total petroleum refined for six months, from July to December, 1865, 14,027,770. The total of refined oil for the year ending June 30, 1865, was 20,603,146 gallons. Taking one-half as the production—January to June, is 10,301,573 gallons—whith, added to the above 14,027,770, makes the total from January, 1865, to January, 1866, 24,631,343, which is equal to 29,557,612 gallons of crude oil, and which year 29,557,612 gallons of crude oil, and which very nearly measures the consumption of this conutry for that time, as the uses of petroleum in its natural state is very limited, being confined exclusively to lubricating purposes.

The exports for the same time have been:-Crude, 4,102,575 gallons; refined, 25,493,575 gal-lons. Totals-1865, 29,595,659 gallons; 1864, 33,507,423 gallons; 1862, 28,934,944 gallons; 1862, 10,887 759 gallons; 10,887,702 gallons.

The exports from Philadelphia, for the year 1865, have increased largely, and we are only 1,971,5624 gallons behind New York (or equal to our December exports) in our shipments. The of Philadelphia shows an increase of 4,491,9141 gallons, in 1865, over 1864, while, during the corresponding time, New York shows a failing off of 7,062,167 gallons.

Having finished shopping, she re-turned to find the house on fire. Henry Hilbert testified that the kev of Mrs. Mathers' resi-dence was left at his dwelling by the defendant, who did not remain many minutes, but stated that he was in a hurry, and then went away. Not many minutes elapsed before the alarm of fire was given. Mr. Henry Mathers testing that fire was given.
