MANUFACTURE OF PLAYING CARDS. - The playing-card manufacturers in Paris occupy the quartiers Bonne Nouvelle, St. Mery, and St. Victor. There are seventeen of these head men, of whom nine employ above cleven workmen. Employing 260 persons in all, card manufacturers make on an average 2,000,000 in the year. Of these 260 persons 167 are men, 78 women, and 15 either boy or girl apprentices under 16 years of age. The men are overseers, painters, pasteboard makers, gummers, cutters, moulders, polishers, bellows-blowers, and porters. The women are sorters, scrapers, pressers. The men work either by contract or by the day, and earn from 4 francs to 7 francs. The women earn from 1 franc 50 centimes to 3 francs. Apprentices from 75 centimes (that is, 7\dagged.) to 1 franc 50 centimes. They have two hours for meals in their twelve hours' work. Of 67 who can read and write. 15 are noted for bad conduct, and 15 seldom come to work on Mondays.

A HUMAN CURIOSITY, -The Berlin newspapers have the following curious paragraph:—"A Hungarian girl, born at Oedenburg, without hands, now twenty years of age, has been giving some curious representations in the Prussian capital. She performs with her mouth the functions of hands. She sews, embroiders, executes the most delicate work with pearls, even threads her needles and makes knots, all with the tongue, apparently without difficulty, and certainly without the assistance of any one, Part of the works thus executed are destined for public exhibition." CATTLE DOWN, GOATS UP .- An Irish paper notices the fact that one unexpected and curious effect of the cattle disease in England has been to raise the value of goats to an extraordinary degree. These hitherto despised animals are now exported in considerable numbers from Ireland, and have been sold in several English counties at from £4 to £5 each, the ordinary price having been about 10s.

BRITISH COINAGE.—The coinage at the Mint in London, for this year, will cost £49,182, of which £10,000 is for gold, £30,000 for silver, and £7500 for copper. A sum equal to the last will be re-covered by the sale of old copper not required for the recoinage. The seignorage to be paid into the Exchequer in respect of the year's coinage of silver is estimated at £30,000.

A VALUABLE SPINNET .- The late French composer Clapisson left among his treasures a spinnet of the sixteenth century, which is said to be worth at least sixty thousand francs.
