

Discovery of a New Star.

The following communication appears in the Boston Transcript:-Will you oblige me by mak-ing public the extraordinary and interesting phenomenon of the appearance of a new and brilliant star, in the heavens, doubtless a vaciable star of long period?

Mr. Seth C. Chandler, Jr., of Boston, a young astronomer of great earnestness and promise. has been for a considerable time engaged in the careful determination of stellar magnitudes. with a view to the discovery of any variability which may exist, and has already found reason to suspect fluctuations in the brilliancy of several stars heretolore supposed constant. On Monday evening, May 14, being about to repeat some observations of the magnitude of the stars in the constellation of the Northern Crown, he perceived a new star in that well-known group, brighter than any of the others, with one excep-tion, and certainly brighter than the third magnitude. The recent unfavorable weather had greatly interfered with observations, but he is positive that, three weeks previous, no star was there of sufficient brightness to attract attention.

The new star is close to the star Epsilon Coronie, from which it is distant less than a degree in declination, and is this evening a very conspicuous object, being still as bright as any star but one in the constellation, although it seems to have diminished in brilliancy least six tenths of a magnitude within the last twenty iour hours. On the 14th, at 11 o'clock P. M., its brightness,

by Mr. Chandler's comparison, was between that of Beta and Gamma Herculis, rather nearer to the latter: certainly two-thirds of a magnitude brighter than either Beta cr Gamma Coronæ, or Epsilon Herculis, and very decidedly brighter than Delta Bootis. To-night, May 15, at 9 P. M., its magnitude was the same as that of Beta Corone or G mma

Hercuils, and estimated by Mr. Chandler and myself as intermediate between the two. It is clearly fainter than Delta Bootis. The magnitude of these stars of comparison were thus determined at Albany in 1858;-

If the new star be not identical with the very faint object noted by Argelander, it is so near as entirely to conceal it.

Such phenomena are not entirely unknown in the annals of astronomy. Besides the wellknown cases of the new stars observed by Tycho Brahe and by Kepler, which suddenly shone forth with great brilliancy, and disappeared after a short period-the variable star Mira Cele attains the second magnitude about once in 11 montus-diminishing in the interval to excreme faintness; but very few cases are on record where so great brilliancy has been suddenly man-fested. The only one fairly comparable with this seems to have been the "new s ar" of 1670. This appeared suddenly as a star of the third. magnitude, disappeared, shone out once more, after somewhat more than two years became invisible, and has so remained.
