The Hospital Committee made a report, stating that isolation is important to prevent the spread of the Asiatic cholera, and offering a resolution that the Committee be empowered to erect tents, etc., for the accommodation of patients, in case of the appearance of the disease. Laid on the table, Dr. James S. De Benneville was elected to fit the vacancy occasioned by the death of Dr. Charles P. Tutt. The Steward's requisitions were approved. IMPROVEMENT OF LINCOLN AVENUE .-The Committee of Councils appointed to confer with a committee of citizens in reterence to the improvement of Lincoln avenue (late Broad street), held a meeting last evening. Colonel Gray, of Select Council, was chosen chairman. The committee of citizens, composed of Mesers, Howard, Mitchell, Little, Jayne, and Kirkpatrick, were present. The Committee of Councils, it was understood, would report to Councils an ordinance to prohibit the laying of any more turn-outs on the street, and providing for the removal of those already in use as fast as they may be vacated.

During the affray blows were ireely given, and Patrick, when rescued from the conflict, looked as though he had just returned from the war, having received several ugly blows in the face, from the effects of which the blood flowed freely. He was then introduced to Alderman Devalin, who held him in \$500 to answer, in default of which he was sent below. While on his way in one of the cars of the Union line he attempted to make his escape, but in this he was prevented by the officers, who finally lodged him in his new quarters at Moya-

THE PUBLIC HEALTH .- Philadelphia at the present time may be said to be the healthlest city in the United States, the deaths from the 19th to the 26th instant only numbering 238, ircluding 8 from the country and 12 st ll-born. The deaths since the 1st of January, 1866, number 5727, while during the same period in 1865 they amounted to 7429, or 1700 more than the present year. When we consider that the population of Philadelphia has increased considerably since the mortality return for 1865, the above tatement is highly gratilying. The Board of Health issued a notice yesterday, declaring all rag and bone establishments in the city nuisances prejudicial to the public bealth, and requiring them to be closed from June 1 until October 1, unless permitted to be kept open by the Board of Health.

BREVETED,-Lieutenant John E. Norcross. late of the 25th Regiment United States Colored Troops, has been contirmed as brevet captain for neritorious services during the war. Captain Noticross, while engaged in the capacity of re-porter for the morning papers, was drafted, and although entitled to exemption for defective eye-sight, reported for duty, and was assigned to the sight, reported for duty, and was assigned to the listh R giment. He was subsequently appointed second heutenant in the 2-ta United States Colored Troops, serving on General Camby's staff. He had applied for enlistment as a pri-vate, and was rejected. When drafted he was no longer refused. He was the first white man drafted in the first Congressional district to report himself ready for duty. He resigned when the war terminated.

A PROSPECT OF COMPLETION .- The work on Chesnut street bridge is being hurried for ward, and the entire structure will be completed in September next. Passenger cars will commence to cross ever on the Fourth of July. The roadway is to be laid on 388 cast-iron plates, each measuring 6 feet 6 inches, by 4 feet 4 inches. The first layer will consist of three inches of cement; over this will be spread five inches of gravel, and Belgian blocks, four inches in thickness, will form the surface; 194 plates, similarly covered, will sustain the lootways for pedestrians. When all is done, about 2,900,000 counds of cast-iron and 600,000 of wrought metal will have been used in the structure.

REVISION OF GRADES .- That portion of our city which hes between Ninth and Thir-teenth streets, and Berks street and Susque-hanna avenue, has been unimproved because of the grades being too low for the surrounding district, thus leaving it in a basin, with no outlet for the rain falling upon it. As the improve-ments are now rapidly extending in that direction, the citizens have peritioned for a revision of the grades. The Board of Surveyors visited the locality last week, and after examining the ground, adopted a resolution recommending Councils to have the work of revision done.

The concussion of the atmosphere was such that the glass of all the windows which happened to be closed at the time, within a radius of three or four hundred yards, was smashed; indeed, it is said that some windows at a much greater distance were also broken. The destruction of the build ness was instantaneous. In the immediate neighborhood the damage done was very great."

The subject of the exportation of the oil has peen discussed in the Sydney Legislature, and he Collector of Customs has been directed to communicate with the Board of Customs of England. Mr. Milner Gibson stated in the British House of Commons, on the 14th instant, that "the law gave no power to interfere in the shipment of these explosive oils, but it was a matter worthy of consideration."

VALUE OF REAL ESTATE IN LONDON.-The Weslevan Methodista, some time ago, built a hall in Bishopsgate street, London, a freehold, which cost them £35,000. They have been recently offered £157,000 for the property. In the course of evidence given recently before the Deputy Recorder of London, it was stated that land near St. Paul's Courchyard was worth £1,000,000 per acre.
