A NECESSARY PROVISION .- The ordinance passed by Select Council to promote public cleaniness and health will be considered public cleantiness and headth will be considered in Common Council on Thursday. Is provides that all persons desiring to connect with any of the rewers in the street shall make application at the Department of Surveys, and pay for the privilere, \$7.50 for all premises not exceeding sixteen feet in width, and all over that width \$10, except they have paid proportionably for the construction of the said sewer, in which easo the sum of \$3 shall be paid. The Chief Engineer and Surveyor is authorized to appoint a com-petent person in each Survey District to make such connections with the sewers, and the ex-penses thereof (excepting the repairing) to be deirayed by the person to whom the privilege is granted. Len privilege is granted to connect with any size, the Department at Surveys is authorized to issue a hourse. The ordinance also provides that no new

The ordinance also provides that no new dwelling-house, store, or other building shall be erected on any street or alley in which there connection, by drain pipes, with the sewer, without providing in underground connection, by drain pipes, with the sewer, for carrying off all drainage that would otherwise flow over the footway; and in all cases where there are gutters now over the footway which, in the opinion of the Chief Engineer and Sur-veyor, are objectionable, and are situated upon a street where there is a sewer, or where, in the erection of new buildings after the passage of this ordinance, the directions herein specified have been disregarded, it shall be the duty o the Chief Engineer and Surveyor to give written notice to the owner or occupants of the premises to connect with the sewer by underground drainage; and, in case of non-compliance with said notice for the space of thirty days, there shall be incurred a penalty of \$30 for each month of future.

No license shali be hereafter granted to make connection with a sewer for the purpose of pre-venting the overflow of a privy well, and no sub-stance shall be conducted into a sewer which will not be carried off by suspension in water; and all such sewer connections now existing shall be cut off by the Chief Commissioner of Highways within thirty days after written notice has been served. It shall be the duty of each passenger railroad company occupying the streets, whenever the track may be over a sewer, to make, at their own expense, a connection be-tween the horse-path of their track and the unferiying sewer, at such points and in such manner as shall be approved by the Chief Engineer and Surveyor; and upon the failure of the company to do the work, it is made the duty of the Chief Commissioner of Highways to have the same done and the cost to be paid by the com-pany. On all connections with sewers made by persons in violation of the ordinance, a penalty of \$50 mill be incurred. of \$50 will be incorred.

REMOVAL OF NUISANCES, - The Committee on Health of Councils have inspected all books, papers, etc., at the office of the Board of Health, and reported that of the \$20,000 approprinted for special sanitary purposes, \$11,574'01 had been expended up to the 1st of May, the principal portion being for the payment of principal portion being for the payment of salaries of five clerks and twenty-seven Sanitary Inspectors. The report also states that up to May 1 the inspectors had reported 9105 nuisances, and the citizens 670, making a total of 9885. Of these there were 103 streets; 6 sewers; 10 gut-ters; 2 alleys; 14 courts; 2 docks; 111 houses; 473 yards; 879 cellars; 4492 full privies; 176 foul doc 192 leaks do. 17 waterclosets; 171 drains; do.; 122 leaky do.; 17 water-closets; 171 drains; 208 alleys; 39 hog pens; 31 horse stables; 27 cow stables; 101 manure heaps; 57 vacant lots; 5 rag and bone shops; 2 factories; 34 slaughter houses and yards; 27 ponds of water; 1 bone and boneboiling factory; 20 cellar residences; and 03 dead animals; making a total of 7673. Of these, 2192 were removed by owners of different premises. Total number of complaints returned as now complied with, and placed in the nands of the Health Officer, 1206. CONOCKSINK CHEEK CULVERT. - This large and important cuivert, which drains a portion of the north and northwestern part of the city, is fast losing its capacity in connequence of refuse matter emptying into it from culveris and factories from Front street to the Delaware river, a distance of nearly half a mile. The attention of the Highway Depart-ment has frequently been called to the condi-tion of this culvert, but so far no effort has been wade to heave it chosed out. These tion of this cuivert, but so far no chort has been made to have it cleaned out. There are three-cuiverts at Front street, each eleven feet in diameter, and their full capacity is necessary for the proper drainage of the soction along the line of the sewers; but at present the three are more than one-third filled with mud. bricks, etc. The salety of the cuiverts, and the hearth of the neighborhood, demand that the work of cleansing should be commenced at once.

A PORCINE RAID .- Within the past few A FORCIAE BARD.-- Within the past Yew days agents of the Board of Health have been seizing hogs in the First and Twenty-lourth Warde, in accordance with a notice in a pro-clamation issued by the Board of Health on the 24th of April, to the effect that after the expira-tion of fliven days the law prohibiting the keepng of hogs in certain portions of the city would be enforced. This has caused some complaint on the part of persons whose hogs were seized, who claim that they had no knowledge that such a regulation was to be enforced. Due notice was, however, given, but probably escaned attention on account of being in a proclamation containing several other subjects. Persons who are keeping hogs in violation of law should at of ce remove them, as it is the determination of the Board of Health to have the law enforced.

OBTAINING MONEY UNDER FALSE PRE-TINEES.—A man named Bolton was held in \$500 bail yesterday atternoon by Recorder Eneu, upon an alleged charge of obtaining money under laise pretentes. It appears that a com-pany known as the North Carolina Colony Company advertise tracts of land of one hundred acres each, for sate at \$2 an acre. Several young men have applied at the office of the Company. and have been compelled to pay down \$50, with the understanding that the remaining amount was to be paid in such a time. These men have visited the locality wherein the land was said to be located, but found that the same belonged to other parties. Mr. McClemens, one of the swindled parties, testified that he paid \$50 over to Mr. Bolton. The defendant was held for a further hearing on Friday next.

COMPLETED .- The forty-eight inch water main, connecting the turbine wheels at Fair-mount with the Corinthian avenue reservoir, is now in working order, and yesterday water was passing through it at the rate of from 10,000 to 12,000 gallons per minute. This amount of water is supplied by the three turbine wheels in the new wheel-house, to which are attached six pumps. The completion of this connection enables the Chief Engineer to stop the Spring Garden works until the weather gets hot, and supply the entire city, except Kensington and the Twenty-lourth Ward, from the Fairmouns Weather Works.

TAX RECEIPTS .- The receipts from municipal taxes are not very heavy at the present time, amounting daily to \$5000 or \$7000. There is still a large amount due on the duplicate of Is 66, and all who pay now receive a discount of one per cent, a month for the balance of the wear. Every citizen should avoid becoming a delinquent when the year closes, and thus save heavy costs and the danger of sale by the autho-vition ritics
