PROCEEDINGS IN COUNCILS,-The Stated Meeting of Councils was held yesterday after-

Aslect Council.-A communication was received from the Chief Engineer of the Water Works, in answer to a resolution as to what con-tracts have been given out and work done by the Department since the passage of the ordinance appropriating the one million dollars loan for the extension of the Water Works. The Engineer reports that the work done is as follows: 30-inch main in Poplar street; 20-inch main in Washington street; crib in front of Fairmount dam; improvements at Delaware Works; 48-inch main from Fairmount to Corinthian avenue reservoir; 30-inch main from Corinthian avenue to Kensington reservoir; Roxborough reservoir; engine at . xborough. The entire amount ex-pended to cate from this loan is \$272,238-77. Of this amount there was expended for work and material under written contract, \$147,018'55; wages paid to men employed directly by the Department, \$76,679'73; labor, material, and supplies ordered without written contract, \$33,666 38; damages, \$1200; real estate, \$13,629 11; license for extension of wharf, \$45. The Committee on Water reported an amend-

ment appropriating \$8449'98 for the purpose of managing the Germantown Water Works for the remainder of the year 1866. Agreed to. The Committee on Schools reported an ordi-nance for the purchase of a lot on Callo whill street, near Dillwyn street, for school purposes.

The Committee on Prison reported that the prison is overcrowded, and submitted an ordinance for the purchase of a lot adjoining the prison, for the purpose of extending the prison.
(The price is \$12,500). The ordinance was post-

Mr. Freeman offered a resolution requesting citizens to testify their respect for General Scott by closing windows during the time of the funeral, and directing the Commissioner of City Property to nave the State House bell tolled between the hours of twelve and two o'clock on Friday (to-day). Agreed to.

Wagner, from the Committee on Law, submitted a report in regard to the right of members of Councils to act as Trustees of the Gas Works. The opinion of the City Solicitor is that a Trustee may be elected a member of Councils, but Councils cannot elect one of its own number as Trustee. The Committee was discharged from the further consideration of the subject.

The same Committee reported that the City Solicitor had been addressed in regard to the power of Councils to prosecute for misdemeanor the City Commissioner for illegal practices in giving contracts for supplies for 1865. The City Solicitor is of opinion that Councils have such

power. William S. Grant and William J. Taylor were elected Trustees of the City Ice Boat. Adjourned.
In Common Council.—Mr. Harper offered the following resolutions on the death of Brevet Lieutenant-General Wintield Scott:-

Resolved, By the Select and Common Councils of the City of Philade phia, that we have heard with protound sorrow and regret, of the death of Brevet Lieutenant-General Winield Scott, the late illus-trious commander of the army or the United States, whose name is indissolubly connected with the honor and glory of his country, and whose fame has proclaimed him the greatest captain of the age in which his services were rendered.

Resolved. That we deeply sympathize with the relatives and iriends of the deceased, as well as with our fellow-citizens generally, in their great loss; that we revere his many virtues, and condole ourselves in the belief that his departed spirit is enjoying a b.eseed immortality Resolved That a copy of the above resolutions be forwarded to the surviving members of the lamity of the amented dead, and that the members of Coun-els wear the usual badge of mourning for thirty

Unanimously adopted. A communication from firemen, asking that the State House bell be rung at all times for fires, was referred to the Committee on Fire and

Trusts. The resolution offered by Mr. Evans at the last stated meeting, providing for the appointment of a committee of five of Common Council to examine into the management of the Philadel phia Gas Works, was taken up and passed-yeas

The ordinances from Select Council providing or laying water pipe, and also for the certificate of loan, were agreed to.

The amendment to the resolutions in reference

to the death of General Scott was concurred in.
The resolutions from Select Council discharging the Committee on Law from the further consideration of the subject of Trustees of the Gas Works receiving pay for services was taken up, when Mr. Hetzel moved to amend by directing the City Solicitor to proceed to collect the money paid the two Trustees for services. Mr. Evans moved to amend by adding the names of others who had been paid. The whole subject

Mr. Harper offered a resolution requesting the Commiss oner of City Property to inform Councils by what authority he has issued pro-posals for work at Fairmount Park without

authority of Councils. Agreed to. Mr. Billington submitted a resolution to the effect that Councils will visit Chicago and St. Louis during the summer recess, and that a joint committee be appointed to make the arrangements, providing that the city be at no expense. Agreed to.

POLICE AFFAIRS .- William Sloan, colored, had a hearing before the Recorder vesterday, on the charge of stealing \$240 from Alexander Jones, recently discharged from the navy. Jones testified that Kennet Sloan also made great professions of friendship for him, though he had never seen him before, and invited him into a house, where he fell asleen, and was robbed. The honorable discharge of Jones was got from the beot of Sloan. Held for trial.

Christian Herman was arrested at Fifth and Jefferson streets, on Wednesday, on the charge of reckless driving. Alderman Shoemaker held him for trial.

Edward Dugan had a hearing before the Recorder, yesterday, on the charge of committing a violent assault and bartery on Michael Fitzgerald, a chaiseman. The assault was committed at Che-nul and N nth streets. Duran, it is aileged, using a blackjack. He was held to bail to answer the assault and battery, and the charge of carrying a concealed deadly weapon,

CHURCH DEDICATION .- The new and beautiful brown stone chapel, at Broad and Oxford streets, was dedicated last evening. The building has a front of 42 feet on Broad and 80 feet on Oxford street, and cost \$18,000 and \$2500 for furnishing it. From the report, read by Mr. J. S. Cummings. It appears that the idea of establishing a church in this locality origi-nated in a Sunday School, organized on the last Sunday in January, 1864. The ground purchased for the chapel is 100 by 239 feet, and it is the design of the movers to this enterprise to commence at once the erection of a first-class church, in connection with the chapel, to be called the Carmel Presbyterian Church. About \$30,000 has already been contributed towards the new church. The exercises last evening consisted of singing, reading of the Scriptures, and addresses by Rev. Albert Barnes, Rev. Thomas Brainerd, D. D., and the Rev. Walcott

DISCHARGED.-John Pennypacker and an individual well known as Dr. Burdell, indicted on the charge of dealing in counterfeit money, on the oath of H. O. Wright, the Government detective who had been indicted in Washington for passing counterfeit money, and who absenced himself at the last term of the Court, and was committed for contempt by Judge Cadwalader, were before the United States District Court yesterday. As Judge Cadwalader, in a case tried the day previous, had instructed the jury that it would not be sale to convict on the testimons of Wright alone, and as there was no other wit ness either in the case of Pennypacker or Bor-dell, the bills of indictment were laid before the tury without testimony, and verdicts of not guilty taken. Wright would have testified that he bought counterfeits from them. The defendants were discharged.

POLICE ITEMS.—Cornelius Boyer, alias William Simpson, was charged yesterday after-noon, on the oath of Theodere Mann, bootmaker, No. 109 South Tenth street, with passing a \$50 counterfeit United States greenback. Mr. Mann testified that Boyer has dealt with him for a number of years; some time during March last he ordered a pair of snows, and gave the \$50 bill in payment; he then said to witness that he wished him to make him two more pairs of gaiters; that he would call for them in a week or two; that he was a dealer in horses; witness took the note to bank; it was pronounced bogus;

Boyer never called for the shoes.

Detective Henderson testified that he knew the accused as Cornelius Boyer, or "Big Tom;" do not think he is a dealer in horses; have known him for several years; he formerly kept tavern on South Front street.

Boyer was held to answer at Court by United

States Commissioner Sargeant. James McManus was charged vesterday morning with obtaining goods under false pretenses, It seems that in the spring of 1858 McManus called at the jewelry manufactory of Messrs. Dreer & Seers, Sansom street near Sixth, and represented that he was extensively engaged in business in the city of Caraccas. Venezuels, naming a number of firms in that place for reference. By this means he succeeded in obtaining twelve gold chains, valued at \$216.94. Some time after the transaction Messrs. Dreer & Seers ascertained that they had been swindled. They at once endeavored to ferret out the guilty party, but were unsuccessful until Wednesday, when they ascertained that he was in the city a warrant was then issued for his arrest. McManus states that he pawned the chains. He was held in \$1500 bail to answer at Court by Alderman White.

A young man named J. H. Stine was charged vesterday morning with larceny. It appears that the accused was formerly employed in a store in Clearfield, Pa. A few days ago he left, stating that he was coming to this city in search of employment. After he had started his employer discovered that he had been robbed, and alleges that the accused is guilty of the crime. He wrote to Messrs. White & Pechin, merchants, on Market street, near Fourth. description of Sune, and for them to look out for him. Yesterday morning he entered their store in search of employment. While one of the firm engaged his attention, another person stepped out and called in an officer, who ook him into custody. He will be sent to Clearfield for trial.

FATAL ACCIDENT.-Yesterday afternoon two well-diggers, who had dug a large well in a yard at Quince and Locust streets, lost their lives from fout air. The well had been dug alongside an old one, and it was tapped, one of the men being down at the time. The foul air at once overcame him, and the other, proceed-ing to his assistance, was rendered unconscious An alarm being given, the members of a neighboring fire company burried to the scene, and succeeded in getting the men out. One of them was dead, and the other dled almost immediately after. The Coroner held an inquest on the bodies, and a verdict of death by suffocation was rendered. The names of the men were Paul Donnelly and William McCue, the first 37 years old and the other 48. Both were married
