\$25,000,000.

During the three weeks ending with Saturday, June 2, the officially declared exports of gold from this port were rather over than under \$25,000,000.

These are grave facts. They are full of admonition. Had our currency been based on specie, such a drain upon our coin would have diminished all current values from 10 to 25 per cent., causing very general embarrassment, if not absolute stagnation.

We must get back to specie payment at a very early day, unless we are content to settle down into a nation of gamblers, wherein every business operation is a lottery, and every man a gambler.

It is Congress we must look to, and after the 1st day of January next, all the Treasury notes of the United States should be redeemed in coin at the Sub-Treasury in this city.

Had Mr. Seward adopted the late neutral policy of Lord Russell, the result would have been different. He would have shown to England that her retention of Ireland, as well as her North American possessions, depends henceforth upon her good conduct towards the United States.

Meantime, we pray Congress to make such changes in the tariff as will furnish some barrier against enormous, excessive importations.

Congress and the Fall Elections.

The compromise arrived at by the Senate in choosing the Reconstruction amendment gives evident satisfaction to the great majority of the Union party throughout the country.

The idea of a Congress of the great powers of Europe to decide upon the points at issue between Prussia and Italy and Austria, seems, according to our European advisers of the 23d ult., to be taking shape and conviction.

The basis of the agreement to be proposed by the Congress seems to be the shape of certain surrender of territory, and concessions of provinces to be made by one to the other of the three countries at danger's point.

It must be confessed, however, that the satisfaction expressed in view of the improved position of the Union party in the States proceeds more upon what is yet hoped for than upon what has already been accomplished.

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While, however, Europe is enjoying a breathing spell over the possibilities of peace, the work of military preparation goes bravely on.

The Fenian Invasion—American Versus British Canadian Neutrality.

From the Herald. Colonel O'Neill's advanced corps of Fenians, in the absence of artillery and unexpected reinforcements, have returned by way of Buffalo from their Canadian incursion, and surrendered to the United States authorities.

In this the Government has been generous to England and Canada, in view of the fact that the Fenians, in their headlong rush, were at Montreal, and her Majesty's provincial officials, and most influential subjects generally sympathized, and aided and abetted or winked at the Fenian plots and cutthroat and incendiary adventures of these agents of the Revolution.

An important assembly of deputies from the minor German States has been held at Frankfurt.
