THINGS TO THINK OF.—The number of languages spoken is 3064. The number of men is about equal to the number of women. about equal to the number of women. The average of human life is 33 years. IMPRISONMENT FOR DEBT IN FRANCE, -- A point of law relating to imprisonment for debt, of some consequence to foreigners, and not gene-rally known, has been settled by the Civil Tribunal of the Seine. A short time since M. Schuyllmann, a merchant residing in Paris, arrested a Bavarian on the ground that he was about to leave the country without paying his debts. The latter disputed the legality of the arrest, on the plea that his creditor is a Bava-rian, and therefore not entitled to avail himself of the privilege conferred on creditors by the law of 1832. The defendant commenced proceedings-first, to set aside the arrest as illegal; and, secondly, to recover damages for illegal arrest, for which he claimed 20,000f. The creditor, however, pleaded that he had been authorized by an imperial decree to establish his domictle in France, and that consequently be enjoyed all the civil rights of a French citizen. The Court adopted this view of the case, confirmed the arrest, and condenined the prisoner

ANOTHER EXPERIMENT IN ARRIAL NAVIGATION. The ascension of a balloon-ship called the "Esperance" was to have taken place at the Hotel des Invalides, Paris, ou the 10th ultimo, but great difficulty was experienced by the inventor, M. Delamarne, in adjusting the screws, helm, sails, etc. The Emperor, who happened to be driving out and saw the crowd, went to the spot to inspect the apparatus, and conversed some time with the inventor, but at last, not perceiving any great probability of an ascension, took his departure. The crowd then became impatient, and broke through the barriers. At a quarter past 7 the car was attached, and the whole ascended some few yards from the ground, and moved in the direction of the Invalides; but the balloon being either damaged by the machiners or overweighted, burst, and fell henvily to the ground,
