THE PHILADELPHIA GAS WORKS .- The Special Committee of Select Council to inves-tigate the management of the Philadelphia Gas Works held an adjourned meeting yesterday afternoon. Charles Thompson Jones, Esq., President of the Board of Trustees was again examined:—Q. In your report of 1865, page 7, it is stated that the coal was much damaged by spontaneous combustion; can you tell the number of tons destroyed? A. I cannot tell, without reterence to books at the office. Q. What was the cause of the fire? A. Spontaneous combustion. There was nothing cestroyed by the fire except sheds; the Fire Marshal made a careful examination, but he has made no report yet, in consequence of sickness; the coal was on fire several times, the first one in December, 1865; when it was discovered to be on are a large number of carts were employed to haul the coal into the fields; the bill for hauling is at the office. Q. Are not the Works in many respects worn out? A. Not that I know of. Q. Are any improvements or extensions being made to the Works at present? A. The Board are now building a large retort and purifying house at Point Breeze, which it is believed will supply all the wants of the city for two or three years; the Board think the Northern Liberties Works will be taken pos-Northern Liberties Works will be taken possession of by the city, and when that is done there will be no necessity for other new works; have not been compelled to curtail the supply of gas because the works were not of sufficient capacity; the Engineer informed the Board that they were supplying the street lamps with gas for more hours than their contract called for, and the quantity was reduced in December; the Works have been worked to their full capacity, particularly in December last, but there never was a want of supply; the Government tax is thirty cents per thousand feet; in Boston the Gas Works pay asand feet: in Boston the Gas Works pay bout \$6.50 per ton; New York gets coal from Nova Scot a cheaper than the coal furnished the Philadelphia Gas Works. Q. What was the cost of laying a main from Robinson Mill to Germantown? A. I cannot tell; but I can get it at the office; the pipe is still used, and supplies mills and houses along the Wissahlekon; it was intended to give the citizens of Germantown a better supply of gas; but a portion of it issiled to meet the desired end; but it is still of great use to mill owners and other parties.

Q. What became of the old iron when the retorts were used up? A. They were sold to parties who make them up into sadirons. Q. Do you know that the parties who supplied retorts made them of the old retorts? A. The parties deny it, and Mr. Cresson has said and new ones could not be made out of ones; I think there were three bidder or the last 200 retorts contracted for; there was from a half to one cent per pour difference in the bids; the Board of Trustees gave the contract to the lower vidder; some of the members wanted to give it to Merrick & Son, though they were the highest bidders; contracts for retorts are always given to lowest bidders; five firms supply meters. Q. Are any of the Trustees interested in meter establishments? A. Not that I know of; Mr. Lening, I think, still supplies meters.

Colonel Page stated that he would make out

a table from the reports of the Gas Works in reference to the leakage, and other facts, which he would hand to the witness, so that answers could be given at a future time. The witness then made the following state-

MEETING OF THE SPECIAL COMMITTER OF CUNCILS ON THE IMPROVEMENT OF BROAD STREET. -Last evening the Special Committee of Coun als having in consideration the improvement of Brond street, met in Select Council Chamber. Colonel Gray, chairman. The meeting was called for the purpose of receiving the report of

called for the purpose of receiving the report of the Citizens' Committee on the Improvement of Broad Street. They reported—

First. That the following portions of Broad street, from curb to curb, can at this time be appropriated by Councils for the use and purposes of a public drive, carriage way, or avenue, viz:—From the Delaware river, at League Island, northwardly to Washington (late Prime) street, and from Willow street northwardly to Evaluate have the intervening appace or from Fisher's lane—the intervening space, or from Washington street to Willow street being from the provisions of the act of As

Second. That the width between curbs be taken as now laid out, i. e., with a width of seventy-seven feet south of the old Penn District line (between Girard avenue and Poplar street), and fifty-seven feet northward thereof. That and fifty-seven feet northward thereof. That there shall be a continuous macadamized drive the entire length of the street thus appropriated, located upon the centre line of the street, with a width of thirty-one feet south of Washington street, and twenty seven feet north thereot. That between the macadamized drive and the curbs upon each side thereof the paving shall be

made with cobble stones, or such other material as may be determined upon by the property owners fronting thereon, subject to the approval of the Chief Engineer and Surveyor, with the understanding that no change in the character of the paving shall be allowed, unless the same shall be for the extent of one block, and that a course of cubical granite blocks shall be set upon the lines dividing the cobble sione pave-ment and the macadamized drive, as specified for the work now in progress upon Broad street, north of Columbia avenue,

As to the mode of constructing the centre drive, it seems to be generally conceded by those residing upon Broad street, and who have given attention to this subject, that it should be constructed with broken stone ballast in the est and most substantial manner. for a cost not exceeding three dollars per square yard, or a charge per line in foot of frontage of \$5:17 below Washington street, and \$4:50 north thereof, and that the curbing and couble stone paving, when required, should not exceed 80 cents per lineal foot of frontage south of Washington street, or \$2.47 north thereof.

It is therefore deemed advisable, in considering this important question, to present an approximate estimate of the improvement propoled; the estimate being prepared upon the basts of prices heretofore specified, as follows:— From Moyamensing road to Washington street :-
