From the Fond du Lac (Wis.) Commonwealth, May 8). Last Monday evening the peace and quietness and equanimity of Fond du Lac, a city that was never yet disgraced by a mob, or witness before to any worse disturbance of the peace than common assault and battery, was rudely broken in upon by an encounter between two prominent citizens who have nursed, for many years, a bitter personal fend, to wit:—Robert A. Baker, Caehier of the Farmers' and Mechanics' bank, and General C. S. Hamilton, which resulted in Mr. Baker firing two shots from a pistol with which he was secretly armed, at the General, both of which hit him, one in the groin, and one in the left temple, but neither of them striking a vital

The affair took place on the stairs leading to the Young Men's Association Rooms in Reaping's block. The General, as President of the Association, bad opened the polls, the voting had commenced, several had passed in and out, and persons were running up and down stairs to and from the crowd above and below. After the voting had progressed several minutes, the General started to go down upon the strest, and in doing so passed Mr. Baker on the stairs, who was coming up. One version of the story is, that when Hamilton was two steps below him, Baker turned and hurled at him a gross epithet. Hamilton, on the impulse of the moment, wheeled and caught Baker by the left collar, shook him some, and said, "You little villain, what do you mean?"

While they were in that attitude, Baker with his right hand reached into the inside left breast pocket of his coat, immediately under Hamilton's band, and fired his pistol down through his own cost, without drawing the weapon from his pocket, the range of the barrel being, most fortunately for both parties, below the General's abdomen, the ball taking effect in the left groin and passing down, as the physicians suppose, the large bone of the leg. They then bad a struggle for the pistol, for an instant, but the shot paralyzed the leg of the General so that he had not the use of it, and he lost his balance and fell down the stairs, rolling out at full length upon the stone step.

At the instant of his couching the step, and At the instant of his couching the step, and while he must have been at least fifteen feet from Mr. Baker, a second shot was fired, which passed through the crown and rim of Hamilton's hat, just grazing the left temple. He was assisted to his feet by P. L. Morse, asked by him and others if he was hurt, no one comprehending for some seconds that he was really wounded, though they knew two shots had been fired. Our recollection is that he made no reply to any one. recollection is that he made no reply to any o, ve, he being probably unconscious of the question, though he walked almost alone to Leffert's store. Mr. Baker was immediately arrested by Police Officer Van Norder, and was soon turned over to the custody of the Sheriff. The only persons on the steps immediately within reach of the General and Mr. Baker, were J. W. Carpenter and Father Bishop, though there were others close by. Of course neither of them could com-prehend the encounter so as to aid in preventing it, but Mr. Bishop says, as soon as the shots were fred, he grasped Mr. Baker, and said to him:-"In God's name, Mr. Baker, what are you shooting here for?" We understand Mr. Baker replied:—"He insulted me twice on the street today, and I won't stand it."

After it was known that shots had been fired and the General wounded severely, if not fatally, of course, the most trement, we controlled.

of course the most tremendous excitement that the treasured wrath of a personal feud should make Mr. Baker so far forget what was due to the dignity, decency, and civilization of a peaceful community, and to himself as a gentleman, as to arm himself with a deadly weapon while moving among us, intending to use, or being belrayed and provoked into using it so

Mr. Baker was kept in custody by the Sheriff during the night. Tuesday he was brought be-fore Justice Bissell, on a warrant issued by him. Before proceeding to an examination, the case was sworn away from Justice Bissell to the nearest Justice, which, in the absence of Justice Kellogg, was Justice Driggs. The Circuit Court being in session, and the District Attorney and the principal lawyers having business in the the examination of Mr. Baker was adjourned for nine days, and he was release t on bail. The examination will be held on Thursay, the 7th of June.

AERIAL NAVIGATION.

The Voyagers Heard From-Their Pirce of Landing-Particulars of the Trip.

Dr. Andrews and Mr. Plumb, "nose departure Dr. Andrews and Mr. Plumb, "nose departure from this city on the afternoon of Tuesday last, to make another trial of Dr. Andrews' flying ship, was described in yesterday's Tribune, have again returned to the city. We have received from Mr. Plumb the particulars of the voyage. The greatest altitude attained was about one and a half miles, which carried them above the lower stratum of clouds into a clear atmosphere, with a thick curtain of clouds atmosphere, with a thick curtain of clouds above and below them. Through the occasional openings of these they could see the surface of the earth plainly. Mr. Plumb describes the appearance of the fleecy white clouds lying far below them as resembling snow-drift, rolling along over the bright green grass on the surface of the earth.

As we anticipated, the newly constructed rudder proved inefficient. Almost at the first attempt to bring it into requisition the cords became jammed, and the vessel was for a time entirely unmanageable. Afterwards, they regained partial control of her, but the steering apparatus was manifestly inadequate for successful working of the ship. Some other mechanical faults were also discovered, which will be remedied before another trip.

Finding that they could not succeed in the main object of the trip, the voyagers concluded to make a pleasure iaunt of it, and after sailing about for some time they finally landed in safety near the village of Oyster Bay, about twenty-eight miles from the place whence they
