Passage of the Constitutional Amendment by the Senate.

THE Constitutional amendment, as proposed by the Reconstruction Committee, and as modified by the Senate, passed that body yesterday by the unexpectedly large vote of thirty-three to eleven-the affirmative vote being just threefourths of the whole vote cast. It is generally understood that the House will promptly concur in the Senate's amendments, so that we may probably consider the measure as in its final shape. It will then go to the Legislatures of the several States for their approval or rejection. The correspondent of a morning contemporary predicts that the President will yeto the measure. This assertion is based upon a misconception. It is not at all certain that the President would veto the amendment as it now stands, even if it were oresented to him for his approval. But proposed Constitutional amendments do not need the President's signature. The language of the Constitution upon this point is as follows:-"The Congress, whenever two-thirds of both Houses shall deem it necessary, shall propose amendments to this Constitution, or on the application of the Legislatures of two-thirds of the several States, shall call a convention for proposing amendments, which, in either case, shall be valid to all intents and purposes, as part of this Constitution when ratified by the Legislatures of threefourths of the several States, or by conventions in three-fourths thereof, as the one or the other mode of ratification may be proposed by the Congress."

It will be seen from the above that the proposed amendment does not go to the President. It is true, Congress sent the Anti-Slavery amendment to President Lincoln, and he signed it, but he explicitly affirmed that there was no necessity for his signature to secure its validity.

It is fortunate that this great measure, in its final form, goes to the people with what may fairly be claimed as the unanimous approval of the Union party. It has been thoroughly discussed, and all its provisions well weighed. It carries with it the moral power of the endorsement of three fourths of the Senate, and more than two-thirds of the House of Representatives. It embodies the matured judgment of the representatives of the loyal masses of the people. As such, we have no manner of doubt it will be overwhelmingly endorsed by the paople themselves.

The main modification of the amendment made in the Senate was in the third section. As that section stood in the amendment as it came from the House of Representatives, it disfranchised, for ten years, all persons who had taken part in the Rebellion. The Senate has substituted for this a provision excluding perpetually from all offices, civil or military, under the United States, or under any State, all such per. sons engaged in the late Rebellion as had previously, either as members of Congress, officers of the United States, Legislative, Executive, or Judicial officers in any State, taken an oath to support the Constitution of the United States. This will torever exclude from office all the intelligent leading traitors, while it extends clemency to the humble and seduced masses.

Camden and Amboy sold at 129%; Penusylvania Railroad at 55; Reading Railroad at 541@541, a stight advance; and Catawissa preferred at 261, a slight advance. 39 was bid for Little Schuylkill; 55 for Norristown; 62 for Lehigh Valley; 30 for Elmira common; 43 for preferred do.; 314 for Philadelphia and Erie; and 43 for Northern Central.

City Passenger Railroad shares continue dull. Chesnut and Walnut sold at 58. 21 was bid for Thirteenth and Fifteenth; 38 for Spruce and Pine: 18# for Hestonville: 13# for Ridge Avenue; and 38 for Union.

Bank shares are in good demand. Mechanics' sold at 302. 140 was bid for First National; 141 for Philadelphia; 123 for Farmers' and Mechanics'; 53 for Commercial; 301 for Mechanics'; 95 for Kensington; 50 for Penn Township; 521 for Girard; 80 for Western; 621 for City; and 57 for Union.

Canal shares are firmly beld. Schuylkill Navigation preterred sold at 331@331; and Lehigh Navigation at 554@554, an advance of 1. 26 was bid for Schuylkill Navigation common; 120 for Morris Canal preferred; and 15 for Susque-

hanna Canal. -The New York Tribune this morning says:-"Money is increasing in ease, and at 5 26 per cent. borrowers are readly supplied. Prime short paper is scarce and saleable at low interest—as low as 5 per cent. for choice short bits—but long cagagements are not in favor. The alarm shown at every rumor of trouble among the national banks is very significant. cant, and should teach borrowers caution. It is well known that a large majority of these institu-tions live mainly upon their circulation, and that any attempt to make them releem their notes in any attempt to make them re-leem their notes in legal tender would force them into liquidation by scores. For the present vir. Mc-Cullosh has abandoned his effort to bring about specie payments, and is the leading inflationist of the day; but this cannot last, and borrowers must be careful and not be too much ex anded when he returns, as he must, to the principles of his Fort Wayne speach and his annual report. The country cannot afford to continue business upon irredeemable paper and successfully compete with nations paying specie; and to specie we must return at no distant day. The return, come by what route it may, will cause great discreas to all who are debors during the process and are obliged to pay debts with assets daily shrinking under the appreciation of paper and gold. The use of paper money by the Treasury during the R bellion was a desperate resort, and its cost has yet to be borne by the country."

—The Chicago Tribune says:—

-The Chicago Tribune says:-"There are complaints from all quariers to day, of a scare ty of currency, and the money market may salely be reported to be stringent. The heavy receipts of grala for ten days past have caused a constain drain on our banks, and large amounts of currency bave been daily sent into the interior of I linois, Wiscousin, lova, and Manesota Hence the bankers are not as well prepared to supply the public as formerly, and they have to make a closer discrimination of the paper offered for discount. Raice, however, are steady at 10 per cent, per annum at the banks, and 1@1; per cent, per month on the sirect. The supply of Eastern exchange to-day was creater than the demand, but not greater than it has been for a day or two past. The scare ty of currency, however, bus weakened the market, and we note a dechne in rates. The counter rates at the banks were irregular, ranging at 110@120 discount outing and par at 110 premium selving. Hound lots were rold among tankers at 110@120 discount."



In other respects the present dition will be found to have undergone a thorough revise on and arrangement—many fresh chances have been treated or, and the pature and treatment of others considered in secondance with the principles of voterinary science at the present day. The great object of the dditor has been to make the work as practical as possible for all classes of readers by avoiding, as much as circumitances would permit, those technical details which none but the scien fito reader would comprehend. It will therefore, necessarily follow, that any lengthened analomical details must be omitted, a though it is believed sufficient have been retained to enable the general reader to undersand the more important parts of the 'irame. The same remark applies to the chapters on medicines and poisons. In conclusion, the editor trusts that the all erations and additions which have been made will tend to enhance the value of the work, and render this the south of the fourth Edition.
