DIFFICULTIES ATTENDING AN ITALIAN INVASION OF VENETIA-STRENGTH OF THE QUAL RILATERAL. Some papers have expressed an opinion that an Italian army may, with a fair chance of success, attempt the conquest of the Austro-Venetian provinces. There are, however, great difficulties to be evercome by an Italian invading army. The Minclo must first be crossed. That river is forty miles long, from Lake Garda, whence it derives its source, to Governolo, where it falls into the Po. and it is throughout sufficiently deep to present a serious obstacle to an invading army.

An army attempting to cross the Mincio would find itself between two formidable fortresses, Mantua on its right, and Peschiera on its left. These two forfresses are not more than twenty miles distant Some papers have expressed an opinion that an

Feschiera, situated nor-h-north-west of Maniua, and a little more than a mile from Verona, rists on Lake Garda, of which it occupies the southern extremity at the source of the Mincio. The population is not more than 3000 and the fortifications are not extensive, but there is a vast interched camp close to the town, capable of accommodating 15 000 troops.

It would be impossible to attack Peschiera with any chance of success on the side of Lake Garda. Any vessel attempting to approach would be destroyed by the gups of the fort, and the Austrians, are moreover, masters of Lake Garda. A narrow paved road, defended by two tetes-du-pont serves as a communication between the intrenched camp and the town. The camp commands Peschiera and the entire plain ground it, and would render the town untenable were it captured. It has been compared to the bastion Malakoff at Sebastopol.

Peschiera is the weakes of the four fortesses which constitue the Quadri ateral. Manna is sunated on an island to the southeast of Peschiera. It contains a population of 30 0.0 and a garrison of 40,000. It is connected with the land by five paved roads, defended by three tiers of gans. It can only be captured by a regular slege. It contains only 9000 inhabitants, but its fortifications are more extensive than the form.

Two detached forts, a triple wall with bastions, and two tetes-du-pont, present a formidable defense. The approaches to the town may be completely flooded by the waters of the Adige. Vorona is placed in communication with Leynano by a road protected by a line of batteries. The garison of Legano may send a reinforcement to Mantua and to Vicenza by means of a double tete-du pont.

Progress of Dr. Livingstone's African Expedition.

At the recent annua meeting of the Royal Geographical Society. Sir Roderick Murchison stated that he had learned, through a letter of Dr. Livingsone's, dated the 24th of March, to his daughter, that he had reached the mouth of the Royama river in an Arab dhow, with his followers and six camels, three asses, and three buffalces.

As it was found impracticable to ascend the Royama with their vessel, or to disembark the adminison to banks, the party was taken on by Lieutenant Gariorth, R. N., to a fine harbor north of the Royama, where they were about to land when the letter was despatched. As the poople of that tract are under the control of the Sultan of Zanzibar, with whose protection Dr. Livingstone is fully provided, he wrote in the full persuasion that he will not only reach the watershed between his own Lake Nyanza and Tanganyika of Burton and Speke, but also be able to settle the question as to the elevation and dramage of the latter. If he can reach it, and, after bailding a boat on it, is able to proceed to its northern end, he will at once set at rest the dispute as to whether this lake be really the ultimate southern water basin of the Nils. It it should prove to be so it will follow that the aftitude of the Tanganyika, as given by Burton and Speke, was very erroneous, for by their measurement it was more than eight hundred feet below the level of the Albert Nyanza, as fixed by Baker.
