Proclamation by the New Captain-General to the People of Cuba-Definitive Withdrawal of the Spanish Fleet from the Pacific.

HAVANA, June 9.—The long looked for pro-clamation of the new Capian-General did not appear in the newspapers till this morning, though dated the 3d instant. Translated into English, it reads as follows:—

TO THE INBABITANTS OF THE EVER FAITHFUL

Although the campaign just closed has not carried the banner of your nat ve land to the capital of the British Provinces in North America, it has demonstrated to mankind that you had the bravery, patriotism, and skill to accomplish it. You have been vistors on every field that your hereditary enemes dare contest. You have proved yourselves good citizens and brave soldiers, and are disappointed in your full expectations, not through any efforts of English armed minions, but because the administration of a great free country chose to exercise to its fullest limits, and even beyond it, the odous and tyramic provisions of an obsolete law, so as to display its mismaninity to a semi-hostile vation, at an expense of your rights as loyal citizens and the high prerogatives and pride of the greatest na ion on earth. However, your efforts are not without great and important results, which can scarcely be estimated at press it. History, howver, will record them as the highest proof of patriotism ever exhibited by an exiled race, and as the con monement of a struggle which is certain to end in the complete and absolute independence of
