THE PHILADELPHIA GAS WORKS .- The Committee of Select Council appointed to examine into the affairs of the Philadelphia Gas Works, held an adjourned meeting last evening, Colonel Page | residing. Colonel Page stated that he had received no answer from the Trustees to the communication of the 30th of May. At the last meeting of the Committee Colonel Jones had promised to answer certain interrogatories. He was not yet ready, as he had not

secured the necessary information. Mr. John Roberts, Foreman of the First Ward Works, was present, and testified as follows:— Have been foreman about six years; at the present time we have from 325 to 350 men employed at the Point Breeze Works; the "stokers' are required to be skilled; the result of employing unsk lied labor would be to injure the mate rials and works; in order to make good coke tis necessary for the coal to or fully carbonized; since January, 1865, we up e had the requisite amount of skilled "labor," early in 1865 we discharged, with one or two exceptions, all who were not of the same political party as the ma-jornly of the Trustees—this—as done at the order of the Engineer. The places were filled by taking "helpers," and making them "stokers," and employing new hands "helpers;" his did not require us to pay men to instruct the "helpers," the "aclpers" receive \$2.15 per day; the "stokers" receive \$2.25 per day; never heard of a man re-ceiving pay for service- not rendered, except when he has been injured at the works; from 44 to 41 cubic feet is the average for a pound of coal; there can be a leakage of gas after it is put into the holder; gas may leak at the retort or in the pump; we had but one "blow" of gas in 1865, and lost about 60,000 cubic feet of gas; it was considered to be the result of carelessness. and the man was discharged; it was one of the old hands; in 1864 the men at the works in the First Ward stood two-thirds Democrats and onethird Republicans; in 1864 Mr. McCready, an efficient foreman, was discusarged by Mr. Stewart, their Engineer, as he alleg d, for political cause.

Mr. Stewart was a Democrat, and Mr. Mc-Cready a Republican; the break in the holder occurred in 1864; I don't knew of a return of a less amount of coal than that actually consumed, in order to cover up the deficiences in the yield; such a thing could have been done without my knowledge; the average con-umption of coal per day is now about 100 tons; in the winter we use more; the exact heat reon the winter we use hore; the wast used of the winter we use hore; the waste was a scertained through practice; that is the reason why skilled labor is required; iron retorts will last, on an allow we have had remarked. average, seven months, we have had some that gave out in eleven days; the worst retorts we ever had were received in 1864 and 1835; Stileman & Elis furnished retorts in May, 1865, and they suffered the loss; I saw the Cameron coal: tested it, and its average yield was about 4:17; incombination with other coal, the yield was 4 60; the greatest yield with Cameron coal alone was 4'38; the highest of Penn and Westmore-land on section work is 5; the average last month was 4'33, with a portion of Cameron coal used; would prefer the Penn and Westmoreland to the Cameron; have had something less than 1000 tons of the Cameron coal; so far as the works are concerned, I think they are as well

managed as ever before; I mean the Point Breeze Works; I cannot explain how it is that there was a loss, but getting all our bad retorts in 1865, it shows a bad, exhibit; in 1862 the average yield was 4.39, while in 1865 it was 4.08 to the pound; I put this entirely upon the defective reterts; unskilled labor and want of manage-ment had nothing to do with it; the men now

employed are men of experience; some of them have been engaged over six years.

At the close of Mr. Roberts' examination, a sub-committee of two was appointed to examine The Committee adjourned until Friday evenng next.

POLICE ITEMS.-Latayette Myers had a hearing at the Central Station yesterday, on the charge of obtaining boarding under false pretenses. Several proprietresses of boarding-houses testified that the detendant and wite had taken board with them, promising to pay their board promptly, but had not done so. Mrs. Cathar ne Enclish, with whom they boarded for six weeks, testified that Mrs. Meyers had repre-sented her busband to be a Private Secretary in the War Office, but afterwards said that he was selling clears in Philadelphia. None of the witnesses had heard any representations by the defendant in regard to his means or otherwise. The case was continued for a further hear ng.

Jefferson Ely was arrested at the toot of Noble street, on Thursday, in the act of committing what was literally a heavy larceny—the carrying off of a fifty-six pound weight. He was taken before Alderman Toland and held for his appearance at Court.

A movement is about to be made with a view to substitute here a summer police uniform for the winter one, as is done in New York. The police of this city complain very much at being compelled to wear the same uniform in midsummer as in midwinter, no change being permitted by the regulations.

Charles Roeht, manufacturer of hoop skirts, at No. 548 N. Second street, had a hearing be fore the Recorder yesterday, on the charge of secreting his goods, with intent to defraud Messis. Moen & Co., of New York, of \$2730, and Messis. Osborne and Cheeseman, of the same city, of \$2394.53, the value of material purchased of them by the defendant. Amiel Hundemark, formerly in the employ of the accused, testified that early in the month of June, Roehl had a conversation with him, in which it was arranged that the sum of \$6765 should be counted out in the presence of cer-tain females in the factory, and that it should be handed to Hundemark, with instructions to take it to the Farmers' and Mechanics' Bank and obtain checks for it, with which to pay the New York creditors. Hundemark was to have a bogus package, which he was to throw away, and represent that the money had been stolen from him on the way to bank. The false package was taken by Hundemark and thrown overboard, and he went the following day to the Mayor's office and made a statement that the package of money had been stolen from him. He afterwards made an affidavit to that effect, which was taken to New York by the defen-dant and exhibited to his creditors, with the remark that he could not pay his indebtedness, because of the theft of the money. There was also testimony that some of the goods of the accused were sold for less than cost, and that he had in his possession a considerable amount in money and Government securities. He was

THE HIGH SCHOOL CASE.-Next Tuesday the Board of Control hold a special meeting. Its object is to take action relative to the deplorable condition of the Boys' High School, in consequence of the antagonism of so large a portion of the Professors to Principal Maguire. A resolution will be reported by the Committee to clear out the whole faculty, so that next year har-mony may be restored to the now distracted school. To predict the result of the meeting of the Board is impossible. In the meantime, how-ever, there is a vast deal of canvassing in pro-gress, and the friends of Professor Maguire are leaving no stone unturned to secure his reten-tion in his present position.
