MONDAY NIGHT, June 25. Editor of the Evening Telegraph-Sin:-There appears in your paper of this afternoon a communication purporting to have been written by William McElwee, City Pastor, which not only misrepresents me, but has the demerit of impugning the motives of those who prosecuted him for an alleged embezzlement. If there was any one to blame in the matter it was himself. I published the appeal which he forwarded to the Press office. It was especially for Mrs. H. Dowell. In response to that appeal, he acknowledged that he had received, especially for her, \$81.50, and a package of tea and coffee. I took it for granted he told the truth. He paid first

\$10, then \$20, making \$30. Two or three weeks after this Mrs. H. Dowell called upon him for more money. He replied "he had no more for her; she ought to be satisfied." A month after he had received the money he paid thirty dollars more, making sixty dollars. This payment was made because of the intervention of Mr. Charles Perses, a hard-working, industrious mechanic of Philadelphia, whose character, in my estimation, is excellent. The twenty-one dollars and fifty cents, the balance of the amount, was paid in the Court, after a partial hearing of the case.

He further says that he exhibited letters to Mrs. H. Dowell, giving him di cretionary power to disburse the money. Before the Recorder he absolutely said he had no letters; he had thrown them into the waste-paper bag, and they were gone. This was within about twenty-four hours after he paid the last instalment of thirty dol-lars. There are several other misstatements in his communication, but I have not the time nor the patience to cull them out. I have given enough to exhibit the general character of his

publication.

CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT.

A LA SE WHO THE BEAUTY OF THE SELECT

On Monday the special order for the consideration of the Constitutional amendment was taken up by the Senate of Connecticut. The subject was debated at considerable length during the afternoon and evening session. The Democrate opposed the amendment on grounds of expediency and policy, and contended that Congress was poweriess to change the Constitution during the enforced exclusion of certain Representatives from Congress. This view was repelled by the Republicans, who hold that Congress has against conquered Rebels all the powers of conquest. The question will be immediately introduced in the House, where it will be undoubtedly adopted by the Republican majority.
