THE LOTTERY DEALERS IN TRIBULA-TION—SEVENTEEN ARRESTS—EXTENSIVE HAUL OF PAPERS, ETC.—Yesterday morning High Consta-ble Harry Clark assembled a posse of policemen at the Mayor's Office, and marched them quietly at the Mayor's Office, and marched them quietly to Harmony court, where an immediate descent was made on a notorious policy-dealing estabment, situated in that court. The entire party, consisting of twelve full grown men and five small boys, were marched to the Mayor's Office, and at about 2 o'clock a hearing took place before Mayor McMichael.

The men were all either "backers" or "writers," and the boys were employed in printing the numbers. The arrests were made at the instance of a Mr. Skilton, who was one of the witnesses. The names of the grown portion of the party

The names of the grown-up portion of the party under arrest are Charles Leacon. Heary Lanning, Charles Carpenter, Daniel Epley, Harry Watkins, Henry Cramer, Charles Kelly, Joseph Solomon, J. Madison Miller, Elwell Lakens, John J. Collins, and John Tevis. The names of the boys are Thomas Hawback, Harrison Taylor, Harry Coulin, Eraptin, Hawkey, 1 Harry Cantlin, Franklin Hawback, and George Lanning, The entire crowd were brought before the Mayor at the same time, and were seated on chairs in a semicirale around his desk

Francis J. The witness identified all the men arrested and one of the boys named Harry Cauthn. He testified, on cross-examination by Mr. Lewis C. Cassidy, that he had been engaged in the policy business himself prior to a previous arrest and sentence to the workhouse; he knew Mr. Skilton by name.

Mr David Skilton recognized the various defendants; he knew nothing of the place in Har-mony court; he had visited the office at No. 332 Walnut street, and had seen Mr. Miller giving directions to conduct the business; Lewis was head clerk, and Collins chief clerk.

Being cross-examined, he stated that he was not at present in the lettery business, his connection having ceased a year previous; he did not remember having spoken to any one in regard to prosecuting the present part es; his place of business had been No. 920 Market street. High Constable Clark testified to the arrest

of the parties, and to the capture of a lot of policies and drawings in the secretary at the south end of the building. Fifteen officers had surrounded the house and made the arrests. He identified the various papers used in the drawings, and the records of the business.

Mr. Roberts stated, in his visit, a boy had told him the packet he held was "yesterday evening's drawings," and he must return it. He

found Mr. Lewis at the Harmony court office. There was a suit of three connecting rooms, containing a fire-proof safe, table, summer lounge, secretary, etc. Mr. Solomon was at either the fire-proof or secretary.

Chief Detective Franklin testified to having arrested three lads—Charles Stoddart, Charles

Wagner, and John Lamb-on the third floor of the premises No. 129 Walnut street; they were all engaged in the printing of lottery drawings; they attempted no denial of their work, and did not acknowledge who employed them. After the hearing of the evidence, the Mayor bound the entire party (with the exception of

the five boys) over to appear at Court in the sum of \$1000 each. Bail was readily entered as follows:—Joseph Kimes entered bail for Deacon and Lukens; George W. Rankin entered for Lanning, Tevis, Solomon, and Caypenter; Dr. Samuel Bolt for Epley; Clinton Shoch for Watkins and Cramer; and John Crawford for Kelly, Miller, and Collins.

On Tuesday, June 12, the Committee made a formal inspection of the Northern District, and on Tuesday, June 12, the Southern District, and on Tuesday, June 19, of the Southern District.

We found the Southern District in a good condition. Our visit through the Northern District satisfied us that the many complaints from that quarter were well founded. The upper portion of that district was in a most nithy condition; so much so, that it is our deliberate judgment that disease and death must be the inevitable result of a prolonged condition of such fifthy streets. In the personal inspection of the Committee we found inlets stopped up, streets in a filthy condition, many of which have not been cleaned even once, and general complaints of the non-lifting of ashes.

The contractors for this district have applied

to City Councils for lifteen thousand dollars additional to the price agreed upon in the contract, thus admitting their inability to proceed with the work. All the circumstances warrant, and the health of our fellow-citizens demand, the immediate advertises. the immediate adoption of sanitary cleaning adequate to the urgent necessities of the case. Our duty is done; the power and responsi-bility is with your Honor. Yours, respectfully, Thomas A. Barlow, Chairman; William Bumm, James T. 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
