GENERAL SHERMAN IN PHILAD LIPHIA. -Major-General William T. Sherman reached this city yesterday, and put up at the Conti-nental Hotel. In the alternoon, in company with Major-General Meade and Mayor McMi chael, he visited the iron-clads at Leazue Island. and, after an inspection of them, returned to the city by water, and was landed at the south pier of the Navy Yard. A company of marines was drawn up in line to salute the distinguished visitors, and they were received by the chief officer in command at the yard, amid the roar of cannon on the receiving ship Princeton. Neither General Sherman nor General Meade had anything about them to denote their rank, both being plainly attired in cuizen's dress, They returned to the hotel at an early hour.

In the evening the General was entertained at the Union League bouse, and at 11 o'clock he was complimented with a serenade. A crowd, fully the whole extent of Broad street, was assembled to receive the General. In response to the calls General Sherman made his appearance on the balcony, and after the cheering submded Mayor McMichael introduced him to the people. The cheering was continued for some time

after the General commenced his remarks, and his introductory sentences were not heard by the reporter. He was understood to say that he would not detain them long, on account of the rain which was then falling. He then continued as :ollows :-

"I regret that I am compelled to make a hasty visit to your city. I have long desired to come to Philadelphia to spend some days, but have been unable to find the time. Our country is a large one, and I cannot remain long in one spot if I wish to see much of it. I am going to the Rocky Mountains, and I must not make more than a basty visit until a more fitting opportunity occurs. In the meantime, I thank you for coming here to-night. I would much rather you would see me in the day, and see me at your pleasure, instead of standing, as you do to-night, in the rain. But as you have called upon me, I have come forward, more sut of respect to you than for any pleasure I feel in detaining you. I know perjectly well that the State of Pennsylvania, and the city of Philadelphia, have in a thousand ways, not only in battle, but in caring for the soldiers' families, and also in giving a hearty welcome to the soldiers upon their return, done their full share in restoring and making more perfect that Union formed in 1776. We must battle for the Union; we must do it if it's to be done. I do not understand how it is to be done. but it becomes part of our faith to accomplish it as sure as we accomplished the end of the war. That is the duty of my life, and it shall be to the end of my life—to make the Union one and entire. I know it will be done as sure as you are assembled here to night. Which of you four years ago would have said that you would have been here to-night in peace and quiet, and with all the business of the country going on None of you would have dared to assert it. No man could foresee how it was to be done, but every man knew that it would be done, and that we would fight until it was done. All the

other results will follow just as certain. "Gentlemen, I thank you for your kindness in coming to-night, for I feel it was indeed a kindcome in this rain-storm, and I regret that I cannot meet you where we could get a little more closely together and be more friendly. I hope this will satisfy you, for I mend to give you entire satisfaction. Good

The General then retired. In response to the calls of the crowd, General Meade came forward and excused himself for not making a speech. The people were then admitted to the reading-room of the League House, where General Sherman received them, and gave to ait a hearty shake of the hand.

GUARDIANS OF THE POOR .- A stated meeting of the Board of Guardians was held yesterday afternoon, President Erety in the chair. The report of the House Agent of the census of the House, etc., for the week ending Saturday, July 7, 1866, contains the following:—Number in the House at 12 o'clock M., 2847; same time last year, 2508-increase, \$339. Admitted within the last two weeks, 182; births, 13; deaths, 39; discharged, 112; cloped, 57; incentured, 2; granted lodgings, 52; granted meals, 146. Total males, 1180; do. iemales, 1667. Total males and females in the same department, less assistants, 590, The report of the Board of Visitors for the month of June was also submitted. It shows the whole number receiving out-door relief to be 1476, of which 319 were Americans, 421 foreigners, 736 children. The total expenditure for the month

is put down at \$867.47.

The Out-door Agent reported having collected for support cases \$469.98. The Steward reported

the house receipts as \$18.

A communication was read from D. Walton Stewart, M. D., resigning his position as a resident physician of the West Philadelphia Hospital, by reason of ill heaith. The resignation was accepted. An application for the vacant position was received from Dr. Orris, and referred.
