LATEST FROM EUROPE.

The steamship Africa, with A. Cook for a Captain, arrived at Halifax yesterday with one hundred and forty passengers, and some late dates. Her passengers were of the healthiest, and the dates were the latest of any steamer yet.

WATCHING FOR A BITE. DUNE'S FERRY, July 28.

Mr. Series Editor:-I am a Wattonian. No paper can be complete. or even tolerable now-a-days, that ignores the refreshing and hungry sport of Fishing. You cannot expect to fulfil your mission, or to perform your duty to society, until you have six or eight columns on that subject every week. All the fellows in my Club, "The Sportmen's," say

Ltake it for granted that all your readers know how to fish, but I will, nevertheless, give them some hints that may prove valuable.

You should be very careful in selecting a Rod. Different woods are requis to for different fish. Thus for Bass you want Bass-wood, of course; for Cat-fish you want Cat-brier. In some kinds of fishing, you require several sets of lines. This is not, however, the case with Perch; for

any Arithmetic will tell you that one Rod or Pole is always equal to a Perch. You can fish for Trout in almost any Brook you prefer. Perhaps one of the best places is the Neshamony creek, opposite this place, in which you may fish day in and day out without

interruption-without having to change your Fly, although the Fly may change you, at least your appearance.

I have done some very successful Fly-Fishing in a bowl of boarding-house Soup, catching five or six in a minute with a common table fork. It may not be inappropriate for me, before I


