Mis success was not flattering until the arrival of the police, when the pugnacious Benedick was finally dragged away from his prostrate spouse.

This was all well enough, but just here the affair took a new turn. One of the officers belonged to that class who sometimes permit their zeal to lead them into a mistake. He took it upon himself to castigate the roan who had so shamefully beaten his wife. He struck the pri-soner in the race with his fist. He forgot that there was a court or justice to authorize and legalize punishments for such misdemeanors as

assaulting and battering one's wite. The gentleman who had first interfered in behalf of the injured woman thought proper to remonstrate with the officer, reminding him that his prisoner was drunk, even to insensibility. The officer thereupon ordered this lover of law and order to be taken into custody. It was done: two other officers who were present seized him by the arms, holding both of them tightly; they started forthwith for the station, bearing their

prisoner along without his bat. Another gentleman, residing near, who was present, remonstrated against this proceeding, and begged the officer at least to allow his friend to pick up his hat. The result of this appeal will probably cause hum to glance askew whenwhile probably cause him to grance askew when-ever he encounters a blue coat in the future; for he too was taken into custody, and the whole party—wife beater, unoffending citizen, and friend—were unceremoniously marched off to the Station House.

The case was then fully explained to the Lieutenant, who took a sober view of the matter, and ordered the two last to be discharged at once. The officers who made the unwarrantable arrests likewise made ample apology, declaring their great sorrow for what they had thoughtlessly done. The gentleman who had abused his wife was also discharged, as the latter re-membered her vow "to love, honor, and obey," and refused to put in any complaint against

It is very evident that the intentions of the parties who interieted in this case were on the side of law and order, and that they were not guilty of a breach of either. For this reason the conduct of the police is open to severe con-demnation. They should carefully avoid the effects of excessive zeal, as the maxim of the law regards the escape of a dozen guilty men as preferable to the punishment of one who is innocent.

Both of the prize-fighters were young men, not over twenty-two or twenty-three years of age. When the police disturbed them they had fought some eighty rounds in the space of one hour and a half. When they first pitched the ring, to ensure safety to themselves they placed men armed with pistols at the tront and rear of a house on the whar', to prevent the tenant from getting up and giving information while the dgnt was going on. The two brutes fought very carefully and gingerly, and although such a great number of rounds were fought, during such a long time, too, neither of them were much injured. It is highly probable that the two principals will up and at it again, seeing they were interrupted so inopportunely last evening. It a shame that our city should be disgraced by these beastly exhibitions. This is the second prize-tight that has occurred within the limits of this city within a week. Had it not been for the very clever dodge of taking to the river in boats, the police would have captured the principal part of them.


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
