ACCIDENT ON THE DELAWARE-A MAN DROWNED.-Yesterday a row-bo t, with lifteen men from the coal wharves on Windmill Island, was run into by the schooner D. S. Birch, which was coming up the Delaware. The row-beat was not capsized, but she was pushed round with such violence that one of the men, named Michael Rors, was snocked overboard and drowned. The brother of Bork, who was in the row-boat, states that the schooner passed over the unfortunate man. The other men in the row-hoat got on board the schooner, and were landed on Delaware aver.uc. The captain of the scheoner, Mr. A. T. Blackman, of New Jersev, was arrested and locked up at the Central Sta-tion to await a hearing to-day. The drowned man resided at No. 244 German street, where he leaves a wi'e and two children.

THE ROXBOROUGH WATER WORKS .-The reservoir for the new Roxborough Water Works will soon be completed. The embank ments are all up, and the work of puddling has been commenced. The reservoir is 350 feet long on the bottom, 185 feet wide, and about 20 feet deep, giving it a capacity of 12,000,000 gallons of water. It stands 375 feet above Flat Rock dam, near which the Cornish engine is to be erected for forcing the water into the reservoir. The work of building the engine house has been commenced. WASHINGTON GOSSIP. The New York Herald of yesterday has the fol lowing items:-

CABINET MATTERS.

Cabinet matters begin to assume a new phase, according to outside report, and the reformation promised threatens not to be so complete as was at first supposed. The immediate friends of Mr. Stansbury assert that that gentleman producated his acceptance of the Attorney-Generalship upon the retention of Mr. Stanton in the Cabinet, in the retention of Mr. Stanton in the Cabinet, in which he was backed by very strong and in-fluential influences. They allege that he is positively atraid to leave the office yet. I give these statements, with the assertion that they are traceable directly to the parties interested.

CABINET DINNER PARTY.


Secretary Seward gave a dinner party Saturday evening to the members and ex-members of the Caninet, Secretary Harian only being absent, The gathering was a purely social one.

It appears that at Woolwich, England, two years ago, massive machine framings and standards were cast in solid gun-metal, and a large quantity of iron piz, bought some forty or fifty years ago, and then paid for at the rate of £5 Sz. per ton, is used at Sheerness yard for such purposes as building the walls of clinker bins and sullage houses. At Woolwich yard not less than two thousand three hundre I and sixtythree tons have been laid down for paving some three thousand four hundred and thirty two yards of the chain-cable store and testing house. The expense per square yard of labor in laying down the pig has been from 2s, to 6s, 5/d., "varying according to local circumstances;"
