## CITY INTELLIGENCE.

[ For Additional City Intelligence see Fifth Page.]

CHARGED WITH ARSON.-Some days ago a fire occurred at a public-house at the S. W. corner of Eighth and Christian streets, under circumstances that led to a belief that the building was set fire to with a deliberate intention to deirand the insurance company. The place was kept by John Farro and Augustus Lastrico. Yesterday an examination of the case was held at the Central Station, during which the follow-ing facts were elicited:—The fire broke out in the bar-room about midnight, and was discovered by one of the police officers, who gave the alarm, and the flames were extinguished by the Movamensing Hose Company. When the fire was first seen an effort was made to enter the house, but all the doors leading to the barroom were found to be locked, and one of them had to be broken open. There were several families living in the upper part of the house, whose retreat by the stairway would have been cut off had it not been for the prompt extinguish ment of the fire. An examination of the bar-room led to the belief that the fire was the work of design, and suspicion fell upon the defendants in consequence of the heavy amount of insurance and the large claim made upon the Phoenix and Metropolitan Insurance Companies-\$2300 Defendants made out a list of the articles alleged to have been destroyed, which included a large quantity of liquors, Champagne wine, and a number of cigars. Surveyors and appraisers, who had made an examination of the stock damaged, testitled that it did not exceed in value from four to five hundred dollars. The counsel for Lastrico, D. P. Brown, Jr. represented, and said he was prepared to prove that his client was not in the city at the time of the fire, and the Fire-Marshal, who had the matter in charge, said he had been informed that Lastrico was in Boston, and had been for several days, when the fire took place. Farro was held to answer the charge of arson, and Lastrico to answer the charge of conspiring to defraud the Phonix and Metropolitan Insurance

STEWARDSHIP OF GIRARD COLLEGE .- A resolution was adopted at the last meeting of the Board of Directors of Girard College, declar-ing the place of Steward, held by Mr. William Field, vacant on and after the 1st of August. The Board, at the same meeting, elected Mr. F. Hartley to all the place made vacant. Mr. Field, through Mr. Sellers, his solicitor, has filed a bill in the Supreme Court to prevent the Directors from removing him from the office of Steward of Girard College, and from obstructing him in the performance of the functions thereof. The bilt of Mr. Field states "that Stephen Girard, by his last will and testament, provided for the erection of an institution by the city of Phila-delphia, for the education of white male orphans, and bequeathed to said city a large estate for its maintenance, and did direct, among other things, in the words following:-'A competent number of instructors, teachers, assistants, and other necessary agents shall be selected, and, when needful, their places from time to time supplied. They shall receive adequate compensation for their services; but no person shall be employed who shall not be of tried skill in his or her proper department, of established moral charicter, and in all cases persons shall be chosen on account of their merit, and not through

CHARGED WITH BEING ACCESSORY TO THEFT.—Yesterday a dry goods dealer, Mr. Moses Neitters, No. 70 N. Third street, during the absence of his clerk, left the store for a few minutes, locking the door when he left. Upon his return he discovered that the door had been forced open, and that a man was inside. As soon as Mr. Neitters entered the stranger said:—"It I had not been here your store might have been robbed." A casual examination of the goods satisfied the proprietor that there had been a robbery, and he handed the stranger over to the custody of a Sixth Ward officer, who took him before Alderman Hurley. There was an examination of the defendant, and Mr. Neitters testified that between three and four hundred dollars worth of silks and other kindof goods had been stolen, and that the store door had been forced open. The accused, who gave the name of E. Guggenheim was held in \$1000 bail to answer the charge of being concerned in

They were committed for a further hearing.

Smith, Rector of St. Andrew's church, West Philadelphia, in the absence of Bishop Stevens. Several of the city clergy took part in the services, and an address was deivered by the Rev. Dr. Hobart Hare. This is the second church building commenced within a year by the Episcopahans of the Twentytourth Ward, both under the direction and activity of the Rector of St. Andrew's Parish, of which St. James is a mission. A large concourse of people were present to witness the ceremony, which was solemn and impressive. The building is 35 by 55, will have a bell tower, and is designed to seat 200 persons.


