FINANCE AND COMMERCE.

The indications in monetary matters continue to point to a prolonged ease. The national finances are working easily, and there is no pressing demand for money for any of the regular channels of trade. The Secretary of the Treasury will reduce the interest, if indeed he should not pay off his 5 % cent. currency deposits, on 10 days' notice, on or after September 1. These deposits amounted on 1st August to \$68,665,469. His 4 P cent. greenback deposits to the different Clearing house banks of New York, Boston, Philadel phia, Baltimore, Cincinnati, and Chicago, amounted to \$50,000,000. These last he will not probably disturb. But his present currency balances in the Treasury, and the certainty that his Income taxes, aside from other internal and customs revenues, will be very large in August, will enable him to pay off all other interestbearing certificates of deposits. He cannot, on reasonable terms, command for payment any other currency obligations. The Compound Legal-tender notes are not to be had except at a premium on par value and the full accumulated interest. The rates of interest on the street are gradually lowering, and call ioans, in some instances, are made as low as 3 per cent.

Gold opened this morning at 150%, and was a fraction higher at 1 o'clock.

In the Stock Market there was a little more doing, and the investment securities commanded higher figures, 5-20s of 1862 sold at 1091; do, o 1864 at 1074; and the later issue at 1074. The latest quotation per cable from the London market is 681 for the old 5-20s.

City 6s are again coming into favor as one of the most desirable of permanent investments. The new were firm at 984.

In the miscellaneous stock list there were few changes. Reading was weak at 56]. For Pennsylvania 58 was freely bid; 39 for Little Schuylkill; 58% for Norristown; and 56% for Minehill.

The Coal stocks, especially the St. Nicholas, were again in demand and advancing.

The following bids were reported for Passenger Railroads :- 85 for Second and Third: 44 for Fifth and Sixth; 51 for Tenth and Eleventh: 21 for Thirteenth and Fitteenth; and 18] for Hestonville.

Also for Bank shares as follows :- 531 for Penn Township; 55% for Girard; 31 for Manufacturers'; 100 for Tradesmen's; 66 for City; 50 for Commonwealth; and 65 for Corn Exchange.

CITY INTELLIGENCE.

THE CARRYING OF CONCEALED DEADLY WEAPONS,-There seems to be a constantly increasing habit of carrying concealed deadly weapons by our young men. It is a practice that leads to more disturbances and more rioting than almost all other causes combined. Every day as we pick up the papers, we read of the constant use of firearms and knives. There is no necessity in a well-governed city for any one carrying weapons, and when it is done it is generally for the very purpose of getting into a difficulty.

It takes very little to induce a man to quarrel when he has means of deadly offense on his person, and there are many excitable young men who, in a moment of passion, would not hesitate to use them. There were several arrests made by the police authorities yesterday for this practice.

Harry Brown and Charles Collis were arrested by the harbor police in Poplar street, above Front, for being drunk and having in their possession deadly weapons. They were committed by Alderman Becker in default of S800 bail.

Leo Conner was also arrested about midnight in the neighborbood of Fourth and Arch streets, for the same offense, and for acting in a very disorderly manner. He had a hearing before Alderman Godbou this morning, and was held in the sum of \$800 to answer.

THE CHANGE IN THE WEATHER .- The great changes in the condition of the atmo-sphere and the differences of temperature, are the active causes of a great deal of sickness in our midst. Coughs and colds are exceedingly fashionable. Persons cannot be too careful of themselves in these sudden changes. One day it is excessively warm, and the next, we think about our overcoats. For weeks the hot dry weather drys up the verdure and covers the roads with deep layers of dust. Then comes a cold and wet spell, as we have at present. The cold, chceriess drizzling that defies umbrellas nd india-rubber overcoats, and dampens every thing, succeeds. So come tae changes, and it requires the most constant care to guard against them.

CONDITION OF CHESNUT STREET WEST OF THE SCHUYLEILL.-The recent heavy and continued rain has rendered this street almost impassable west of the bridge. Between the tracks of the railroad the mud is almost a foot deep, and is getting worse every hour. Preparations were made some time since to have this street repayed, and the paying stones and Belgian blocks were on the spot in readiness to be put down, but for some unaccountable reason the work of putting them down was not commenced. The condition of the road is really disgraceful, and calls loudly for improvement.
