AN IMPROVEMENT.—Carneross & Dixey's Opera House, in Eleventh street, above Chesnut, has been greatly improved since its close, a few weeks since. 

INQUEST IN THE RINGLEE HOMICIDE .-The Coroner held an inquest yesterday after-noon on the causes of the death of Daniel Ringler, who died on Monday last from the sup posed effects of a kick received in a souffle. The following is the evidence elicited.-Deceased was sliting on the steps of No. 909 St. John street, when Gilbert Weitman came up and spoke to him; he then turned his attention to the daughters of Ringler, who were standing close by, and said he wanted one of them for a wite. Ringler, in reply, said, "You are a married man."

"Yes," replied Weitman, "but I can throw ny wile down stairs and break her neck; and I will make your daughter a second wife.

Ringler told him tost he ought not to talk that way, and said:-"Do you meah to insult

Some reply was made to this, which caused Ringler to get up from the step, and he and Weitman had a scuffle. Mrs. Ringler caught hold of her husband to pull him away, and he fell down, with Weitman ou top of him. Before he fell Weitman was seen by one witness to kick him in the stomach; the other witness did tot observe the kick. Weitman pressed with his knees on the stomach of Ringler, producing hernin, which resulted in inflammation of the bowels and caused death. This was testified to by Dr. Shapleigh.


Dr. William A. Piper, who had attended Ringler, testified that he was called in on Sunday, and that the patient died on the following day; he had been previously in an enfeebled

state. The jury rendered a verdict that Daniel Ringler came to his death of injuries received in a scuffle with Giber: Weitman, on Sunday, Angust 12.
