## CITY INTELLIGENCE.

REPORT OF BOARD OF HEALTH VISITORS. -The Board of Health are now engaged in visit ing the various localities in our city where the cholera has been the most iatal, for the purpose of adopting such santary measures as will be likely to prevent the spread of the disease. On Tue-day the Board visited Chancery lane and Coombs' alley, running from Arch street, and between Front and Second. Here they found a number of cellar tenements which were in such a condition that the Sanitary Committee ordered them closed at once. There have been a num-

ber of fatal cases in this locality.

Brinton street, running north from Master and between Fourth and Fifth streets, was also visited. Here they found three persons suffer ing from enoters, all of whom died during last night. The tenements in this street were found to be clean, and nothing likely to engender the disease discovered; but a slaughter-nouse is located in the immediate vicinity, and from this an offensive smell emanated. The Committee examined the premises, and concluded not to close the house, but gave instructions to have the premises thoroughly cleansed and disin-

The Kensington Water Works were also noticed, and bottles of water taken from the Dela-ware at the point at which it is taken up by the pumps and from the basin, for future examina The water in the basin was found to be low, but it appeared to be clear and pure, as but little sediment was found in the bottle contain-ing the water from the basin; it will, however, be analyzed before any nual report is made upon the subject.

The physicians throughout the city reported to the Board vesterday fifteen new cases and five deaths. Among the cases reported were five from Martinsville, in the lower section of the city; the filthy condition of this place was reported upon by the Sanitary Committee on Monday last. Three or four cases were located in the vicinity of Thirty-fifth and Sansom streets, West Philadelphia, at which point the disease appears to be spreading. The Board yesterday visited this spot, as well as the Almshouse, to see what action was necessary to improve the sanitary condition of the places named. One case was reported to have occurred on the west side of the Schuylkill, near the Gray's Ferry Bridge, and that was also visited.

At the regular meeting of the Board vesterday resolutions were adopted expressive of sympathy for the family of the late Albert Hughes, an old and faithful officer of the Board, who died at the office from cholera, on Tuesday night. The deceased was attended from the time of his attack until his death by Drs. Ward, Taylor, and

MEETING OF THE BAR-A meeting of the members of the Bar was held in the District Court Room yesterday, at noon, relative to the death or E. Forrest Koehler, late a captain in the 114th Regiment Pennsylvania Volunteers. The meeting was presided over by Gustavus A. Remak, Esq. I. Newton Brown and John Goforth were appointed Secretaries.

Joseph P. Loughead, Esq., after a few appropriate remarks, offered a series of resolutions expressive of the regret felt at the loss of the deceased, and of his worth as an officer while engaged on the field of battle in the service of his country, and that, as members of the Bar; they condole with real sorrow with his afflicted family, who have lost by this dispensation of Providence a dutiful son, au affectionate husband, and an indulgent tather. They also re-solved to wear the usual badge of mourning for thirty days, and that they would attend his funeral in a body.

Fire Marshal Blackburn testified that he had arrested the boys on suspicion of firing a building in the Sixth Ward, but was unable to obtain any evidence implicating them in the crime. Palmer was before Alderman Beitler some time since upon the charge of stealing a box of tobacco.

John McCcoi testified that on last Monday week he lost a blue army overcoat from the store No. 18 N. Fourth street, but did not know who stole it. Fire Marshal Blackburn again took the stand, and testified that Diver acknowledged stealing the coat and taking it to his home, there secreting it in a barrel, and finally cutting it up in strips and selling it for old rags. The defendants were committed in default of \$1000 bail each.

THE GIVERS OF STRAW BAIL. - The pro fessional bail goers of the city number about ten or twelve, not more; and some of them, though great doubts are entertained of their owning any real estate, are security to an almost unlimited amount, being taken by magistrates often without a careful examination as to the value of their reputed possessions or the amount in which they are bail. A circumstance occurred quite recently, which shows the neces-sity of magistrates requiring the production of deeds in cases in which the ball offered is not known to possess real estate in his own right The man offered as security swore to the possession of a house in West Philadelphia, gave its location, and said that the deeds were in his own name. He was taken, and a publication made of it, which met the eye of a person who had a claim against him. Civil proceedings were commenced to recover it, and he came forward and swore that the property was his wife's

A FUGITIVE FROM JUSTICE.—Detectives Valentine and Perry, of New Bedford, Massa-chusetts, arrived in this city on Monday night, in search of Edward E. Taber, alias Charles H. Wood, who broke jail at the above-named place in July, where he had been undergoing a tence of three years and six months for bur-glary. The New Bedford officers were taken in charge by Detective Webb, of this city, who kindly assisted them, and on Tuesday after noon Taber was arrested at Adams Express office, where he had called for the purpose of securing a package which be understood his father had sent to him. The prisoner is but twenty-one years of age. He has jumped the bounty three different times, and has committed several glaries. Ye terday morning Detectives Valentine and Perry escorted the fugitive to New Bedford, where he will be remanded to his old quarters, there to serve out his remaining term of imprisonment.

A LITERARY THIEF .- Charles Lynch is a seedy-looking fellow, but he has got quite a thirst for literature. Yesterday he entered the office of Charles E. Smith, No. 1422 South Fourth street, during the temporary absence of Mr. Smith, and was caught in the act of packing up a lot of books ready for removal. A cost found in possession of the accused was identified by Edward A. Spangler, No. 123 South Fourth street, as belonging to him. Lynch acknow-ledged stealing the garment, and pleaded poverty an excuse. He was sent to prison in default of bail for trial.

ACCIDENTS.-Thomas Penrose, aged eighteen years, residing at No. 18 Charles street, between Sixth and Seventh streets, fell from a building on Dock street, below Second, and

fractured his skull. Thomas Comley, aged eighteen years, residing in Green Hill street, had his left arm broken by kick from a horse. They were both taken to the hospital.
