Walker, but he represented himself to be E. A. Bruist, of the firm of Bruist & Co. He was committed in default of ball for trial.

WHO KINDLED THE FIBE ?- J. Lightcap, proprietor of a shoe shop at Front and George streets, had a partial hearing at the Central Station yesterday, in connection with the fire at his shop, which was about 5 o'clock yesterday morning

Fire Marshal Blackburn testified that the defendant occupies the house as a dweiling and a shop; that he has a fair stock; and that the stock, fixtures, and household goods are insured in the Royal for \$3400; that immediately after the alarm of fire was given, defendant, his brother-in-law, and a child were found dressed, the other members of the family being out of the city; that the fire was confined to some shelving in the store; and that the stock was damaged by water to the extent of about 60 or 75 per cent, of its value. The explanation the accused gave of the fire

was that it had been done by an enemy of his from the outside, and pointed to a hole in the shutter-box as the place through which the fire had been pushed. A bung-reamer was in the box, and detendant said that the hole had been made with it. The Fire Marshal gave it as his judgment that the hole had been made from the inside, and he asked for time to produce an exinside, and he asked for time to produce an ex-pert to show it. The handle of the bung-reamer had been temporarily fitted to it, and the wit-ness said that similar pieces of wood were in the cellar of the house. The Fire Marshal further testified that all the personal property of definition pot instance was on his power of defendant net insured was on his person when the fire broke out. The case went over for a further hearing on Monday next.
