Fate of a Desperate Character-His Pursuit by the Police, and Suicide.

Friday afternoon last three individuals, named respectively Walter S. Fuller, Charles Davidson, and Aaron Ward, took a horse and wagon belonging to Mr. Barringer, who resides on the Salt Point road, about one-and-a-half miles from this city, and proceeded to Hyde Park, where they indulged in drinking, abused the bar tender at Jones & Holmes' Hotel, and left without paying their bill. On their way to Pough-keepsie they assaulted three laborers, two of them named Percy and the other Irving. One of the Percys was hit in the head with a stone and badly injured.

During the melee or pursuit Aaron Ward fired a revolver at one of the laborers, the ball, how-ever, not taking effect. The desperadoes then fied, while the laborers went immediately to Hyde Park and placed the matter in the hands of Officer Manuing, of that place. On Saturday that officer came to Poughkeepsie and arrested both Davidson and Futier, and took them to Hyde Park before Justice Dennis, who fined them each \$25. Not having the funds to pay the fine, they were both committed to the sail in this city, and Poughkeepsie officers were sent in pursuit of Ward. Saturday night a consultation was had at police headquarters, and a course marked out by which it was thought he would be apprehended.

On Sunday it was said Ward had been seen going towards Mr. Barringer's residence on Sait Point turnpike, about a mile and a half in a northessterly direction from this city. A carriage was procured, and Officers Halstend and Vandevort started for the place shortly after noon, both well armed, knowing that they had a desperate character to deal with.

In the meantime Ward was cating his dinner very quietly at Mr. Barringer's, the family being present. While the meal was being communed, one of Mr. Barringer's family looking out of the window, exclaimed, "There is a whole wagon load of men stopping here." Ward immediately arose from the table and approached the window. On seeing the officers (lord wasthem in the wagon) seeing the officers (for it was them in the wagon) he darted out of the house, and soon after pro-

he darted out of the house, and soon after proceeded to the barn in a secret manner.

Previous to the above happening, Ward had been in the barn, where he met his brother, who had been looking for him. When he met his brother he kaid, alluding to Friday's matter, "This is a pretty sad affair," and wanted to know how things were in Poughkeepsie. His brother told him the police were looking for

him, when Aaron remarked, "They will not take me alive," Judging from this conversation, it is fair to presume that Ward undoubtedly thought he had killed the man be fired at on Friday.

Soon after Ward reached the barn the second time, Officers Helsted and Vandevort entered the building and proceeded to the hay-mow, where a terrible sight was presented to their

There in one corner lay the headless body of Asion Ward, the sides of the building covered with his brains and spattered with blood, while with his brains and spattered with blood, while above, hanging on a nail, was a part of the scalp and skull of the suicide, which had been blown there, the hair still hanging from it. By the side of the body was a double-barrelled gun, with one barrel discharged. To all appearances he had placed the muzzle of the gun in his mouth, and with his right hand, which was blackened with powder, pulled the trigger. It was, indeed, a terrible sight! All about the loft were seen pieces of flesh and clots of blood. The entire face was gone. On the lower floor of the building was a large pool of blood which had dripped down through the crevices of the floor. He had truly fulfilled his promise never floor. He had truly fulfilled his promise never to be taken alive. Near the body of the unfortunate man was

found an envelope with the following on one 'I shot myself, and don't think that any one did it but myself.

On the other side these words were visible:—

"And Linda, take care of all my things I leave

The Linda spoken of is a cousin of Ward's. Coroner Haight held an inquest on the remains, the jury returning a verdict in accordance with the facts, after which the body was handed over to the friends. Aaron Ward bore a very bad reputation in Poughkeepsic. - Pough. keepsie Lagle, Monday,
