[SPECIAL DISPATCH TO THE EVENING TELEGRAPH.] TRENTON, September 12.—On the reassembling of the Senate yesterday afternoon, Mr. Winfield, of Hudson, concluded his speech against the Constitutional Amendment.

Mr. Little (Democrat), of Monmouth, made a motion to postpone the subject, supporting it in a very ill-tempered speech.

The bill was then put to its final passage, with the following result: Yeas—Messrs. Acton, Blackman, Buckley, Cobb, Horne, Ludlam, Reeves, Ruby, Scofield, (President), Ware, Wright—11.

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The result was received with vociferous cheers on the floor and in the gallery, mingled with a few murmurs and hisses on the Democratic side.

Mr. Winfield, of Hudson, earnestly opposed the motion, contending that the severance of Jersey City required the instant attention of the Legislature.

After further discussion, the motion was laid upon the table for the present, when the Senate passed the concurrent resolution from the Assembly.

The Stock Market was inactive this morning, but prices were firmer. In Government bonds there was no material change to notice.

Railroad shares were the most active on the list. Pennsylvania Railroad sold at 97, a slight decline; Reading at 57 1/2, an advance of 1/2; Minehill at 57, no change.

Bank shares continue in good demand for investment, but we hear of no sales. 97 was bid for Seventh National; 226 for North America; 147 for Philadelphia; 132 for Farmers and Mechanics; 324 for Mechanics; 55 for Penn Town-ship; 58 for Girard; 90 for Western; 32 for Manufacturers and Mechanics; 72 for Bank of Commerce; 100 for Tradesmen's; 67 for City; 414 for Consolidation; 55 for Commonwealth; 68 for Corn Exchange; and 644 for Union.

In Canal shares there was nothing doing. 28 1/2 was bid for Schuylkill Navigation common; 32 for preferred do.; 67 for Lehigh Navigation; 120 for Morris Canal preferred; 134 for Susquehanna Canal; and 56 for Delaware Division.
