### A BOILER EXPLOSION AT ALBANY.

Ten or Twelve Persons Killed and Several Injured.

Frightful Boiler Explosion. ALBANY, September 12 .- A terrible boiler explosion occurred to-day in the saw and planing mill of St. George Rock, at the corner of Lawrence and Water streets. Ten or twelve per-

sons were killed, and ten others seriously wounded. No cause can be assigned, the engineer being killed. The establishment covered an acre of ground, and it is said the loss will be about \$20,000. The following is a list of those killed:-

John Cullen, engineer, aged forty years, leaves a wife and five children. His body was blown to pieces, which were gathered up in a box. John Hoffman, aged twenty-two, unmarried, employed in feeding the planing machine. John Kirk, a cousin of the mill owners, aged twenty-five, leaves a widowed mother. James O'Neill, aged sixteen, was a carman, and was driving in front of the engine-house. He buried his mother a few days since. John Femmore, fireman, aged thirty-eight, married, leaves seven children. Cornelius Blye, a German, aged forty.

It is believed three or four bodies were blown into the river. The calamity spreads mourning over the city. The streets near the mill were filled with spectators, many of them inquiring after their friends. It is possible that one or more bodies may be under the ruins.

### SECOND NATIONAL CATHOLIC COUNCIL. Arrival of Archbishops and Bishops in New York

-Importance of the Deliberations of the Council, Etc. Etc.

The second National Council of the Catholic Church of the United States, to be held in Balti-more on the first Sunday in October, and which is to terminate on the third Sunday of the same month, will probably prove a grand religious pageant. All the archbishops of male religious orders, the superintendents of seminaries, in fact, the entire Catholic clergy, have been invited to attend, and the invitation seems to have been generally accepted. The Most Rev. Dr. Spaulding, Archbishop of Baltimore, has been delegated by the Pope to preside over the deliberations of the council.

Among the distinguished clergymen now in

this city from the Pacific coast are the Arch-bishop of San Francisco, the Most Rev. Dr. Ale-many, Most Rev. Dr. Blanchet, of Oregon City; his brother, Right Rev. Blanchet, of Nesqually; Right Rev. Dr. Demers, from Vancouver's Island; Right Rev. Dr. Amet, of Los Angeles, Right Rev. Dr. O'Connell, of Marysville, and others. Many of these gentlemen arrived on Saturday last; some, however, came by a different route, and did not reach this city until Sunday. Four of the bishops since their arrival have assisted at high mass at St. Peter's church. It is understood that several of these prelates have gone to Montreal, with a view of securing the co-operation of members of Catholic orders for the education of the youth in the several dioceses now not represented by qualified teachers of the Catholic faith.

The importance of the Convention about to assemble at Baltimore may be determined by the fact that there will be forty-one prelates, at

least one hundred priests, and a great number of supervisors of orders present. The first National Council was held at Balti-more in 1853, and its decrees, after having been approved by the Pope, were published, and their provisions have since been observed in the discipline of the Catholic Church. It is thought the present Council will exercise a much greater the present Council will exercise a much greater influence than the one preceding it, owing to the great increase of Bishops and religious orders of the Church. The direct object of this important assemblage of Catholic clergymen is for the purpose of regulating the discipline of the Church; also for a more systematic plan for the education of Catholic youth.

It is constally understood that the Constaller

It is generally understood that the Convention will advise the endowment of several colleges and seminaries, and that the education of priests and seminaries, and that the education of priests will be a prominent topic of discussion. It is also understood that new Episcopal sees will be established and bishops appointed to fill them. All nominations will, of course, be referred to Rome for confirmation, this being obligatory on all Catholic Councils. An estimate of the importance of the Council may be derived from the feet that the leading minds of the priesthood of fact that the leading minds of the priesthood of the Catholic Church from all parts of the United States will be assembled, and the interests of the Catholic Church throughout the entire country will be represented. The delegates who have arrived in this city have generally been entertained by the friends of the several orders to which they belong, and their reception has not only been cordial but enthusiastic.—N.
