### THE TEACHINGS OF THE PULPIT. To the Editor of The Evening Telegraph:-

The respect in which the Ministers of the Gospel are held is not a whit less than it ought to be. They hold high commissions, their calling is not only honorable, but is necessarily con-nected with the most important interests of

their tellow-men. The clergymen hold a position allowed to no other prominent leaders of public opinion. They address their hearers with no fear of answers being forced unexpectedly upon them; claiming high prerogatives of making exclusive addresses on the subject-matter before them, they make assertions, and lay down arguments without lear of contradiction at the time being. When a minister is preaching the gaspel, when be is proclaiming the messages of peace and salvation from God to man, no one denies or would attempt to controvert the assertions made or the arguments adduced. It is pecu-liarly the province of God's chosen servants to instruct their feliow-men on these subjects, and no interference is to be expected from others. When, however, a minister of the Gospel steps

aside from the objects of his commission; when he uses the advantages of his position to argue other matters, and to make assertions on subjects foreign from his work, he is deserving of censure, and should be answered and rebuked in a manner as public as that in which his assertions have been made. On yesterday atternoon the Reverend John Chambers preached what he would call a Gospel sermon. He lays claim to superior excellence in the particular of not preaching politics, and yet an unbiassed person hearing him on yesterday would unbestatingly admit that the claims of the Gospel held but little space in his remarks. He claimed to take exception to the blas-

phemy of certain publical addresses recently made. That he should do so is to be expected trom his position; he would be recreant in his duty as a preacher of godiness if he rebuked not profanity. With his texts, and his diate comments thereon, we find no fault, but as he progressed his spleen and anger waxed warm, and men were abused and viluted for not

paying respect where no respect was due. Mr. Chambers has claimed that he has a right to his opinion, and that he has a right to act in accordance thereto. No one denies his right, but why caunot he accord the same privilege to others? It men are of openion that the Presi-dent of the United States has thrown aside the dignity of his position, and condescended to make a mere partisan and political campaigning tour, and in consequence of their holding this opinion they refuse to extend to this personage bonors, due the office, but not the man who degrades it, what right has Mr. Chambers or any other preacher to take holy time and sacred place to abuse them for this opinion, and for this action ?

His stur on the memory of the martyred Lin-coln, when he proclaimed that Mr. Johnson was not a sectional President, but the President of the whole Union, was not in keeping with his aemands that men should not + peak cvil of dignitaries. Abuse of a man who died doing his duty is len times worse than not extending hospitalities to a man who lives but to degrade his office and reglect his duty. We hold that the Congress of the United States has a claim to be ranked as one of the "dignitaries of the land," but Mr. Chambers spoke only of the dis honor to the successor of Washington, he not chosing to refer to the abuse and evil speaking which this successor of Washington (?) has thrown at the co-ordinate and superior branch of the Government.

We appeal to Mr. Chambers to leave politics, and political barangues and preach the Gospel according to the terms of his commission, otherwise there is danger not only to the republic but to bimself and to the Church of God.
