THE FRANKLIN INSTITUTE.—The regular monthly meeting of the Franklin Institute was held last evening. THE DUBLIN BANQUET TO MR. BRIGHT. The following is Mr. Bright's letter accepting an invitation to a banquet in Dublin in the course of next month :-

"TO JOHN B. DILLON, ESQ., M. P., DUBLIN. "ROCHDALE, September 1, 1866.—My Dear Mr. Dillon:—I am airaid you will think me long in answering your letter of the 2d ultimo, and in reply to the legislation of the 2d ultimo, and in reply to the invitation to the proposed banquet, which has duly reached me. The invitation is a very remarkable one, and I cannot doubt that it represents an important amount of public opinion in Ireland. To myself it is a testimony of approval and kind feeling which I estimate most highly, although it involves me in no small difficulty, for I have been hoping for a quiet autumn, with an absence of public meetings and of public labor. I am not confident that my coming to Ireland will be of service, but as so
