

THE ORDER OF ODD FELLOWSHIP.

Annual Session of the Grand Lodge—Names of the Representatives—Number of Members of the Order—Amount Expended for Relief.

The Grand Lodge of the Order of Odd Fellowship in the United States assembled yesterday morning at 9 o'clock, on the 21st street, in the Grand Saloon of the Odd Fellows' Hall in this city.

REPORT OF GRAND SIRE VEITCH.

The report of the Grand Sire was presented and read to the Lodge. Referring in general terms to the present condition of the Lodge and its recent progress, the Grand Sire said:—

It affords me pleasure to state that the general condition of the Order is highly gratifying. At no former period of its history on this continent has it exhibited greater vigor and prosperity than at the present time, especially in that portion of the general jurisdiction which was exempt from the depressing effects of the late civil contest, and which has enjoyed uninterrupted fraternal intercourse.

The meeting of the representatives from the various sections of the Order at our last session after so long a separation, and the cordial and happy reunion of the Brotherhood which then took place, gave to the entire Order a fresh impetus, and imparted to it a renewed zeal, which in the main continues unabated.

The past year has been one of unexampled success in our moral and benevolent enterprises. In most of the jurisdictions the accessions have been large, and probably have exceeded those of any previous year. The returns already received indicate that the net gain in the membership for the past year is largely in excess of any corresponding period in the annals of the Order.

It is a gratifying fact that the Grand Sire has full measure of the generous hopes which the events of the last session so fondly inspired in reference to that portion of our brotherhood occupying the Southern section of our field, yet that the remainder have never failed to give us the assurance of their always ready to the Order in the past, and which they still manifest, is a guarantee of its future prosperity in these jurisdictions, and auspicious of the best and most lasting results. We trust the time is not far distant when, with the return of their material and greater triumphs in the cause of Odd Fellowship than even in the former and better days of their history.

Let us continue to evidence towards our Southern brethren our warmest sympathy in their protracted trials and sufferings. Their condition strongly appeals to the benevolence of the whole Order. The destruction of their halls, lodge rooms, furniture, and regalia, and the loss of their property, has been in some sections almost total and complete. Their efforts to rebuild their halls and to re-furnish them have been to some extent promptly and liberally aided by the more favored portions of our material should continue to receive our fraternal assistance.

ANOTHER DISPLAY OF REBEL VIOLENCE.

Attack on a Union Burial Party at Fredericksburg, Va.

Washington, September 18.—A row occurred at Fredericksburg, Virginia, last night, between members of the Union soldiers' burial party and a lot of rebels. There has been considerable feeling of late in that city as to the building of the monument in the Union burying ground on Marye Heights. Yesterday the burial party were paid off. Several of the corps being at the railroad depot at night, the soldiers by light, were branded by a crowd of citizens with unkind epithets; replying in usual complimentary style, the crowd set upon them, and a desperate fight resulted, in which eight men were badly injured. No weapons were used, but intense excitement prevailed. Colonel Moore, Chief of the Burial Corps, left for that city to-day.
