The peculiar relation which Mr. Hamlin bad sustained to the Union party and the country gave great weight to his words, in addition to that which his eloquence and unflinching loyalty imparted.

Previous to the appearance of the orator of the evening, Hermann's Satterlee Band discoursed patriotic airs, to the evident satisfaction.

of the audience. A few minutes after 8 o'clock, the late Vice-President appeared, and was greeted with the most enthusiastic applause. Isaac Haziehurst, Esq., then stepped forward and introduced Mr. Hamlin in the following appropriate words:-

I am grateful, very grateful, for the position that enables me to introduce to this fair and beautiful audience, beautiful because it is tair, the noble champion of true republican sm, whose name is linked nearer than any other to the grandeur and sadness of the past, linked with that of our martyred President Lincoln. (Applause) Our distinguished guest is a tried, loyal American statesman (apolause), the noblest style of man, and we welcome nim to-night for his devotion to the republic. (Applause.) We honor him because he has scorned the wrath and defied the oppression of power. (Applause.) We welcome him also as the representative of a noble State that has unbarred the gates of the morning, and ushered in with the chorus of thirty thousand freemen the sun of American liberty. (Applause.) We welcome him to this audience in the city of the Constitution, and I have assured him that in this andience he will find none that can ever lorget to love-ay, to love-the republic. (Applause.) After the applause which greeted the mention

follows:-These generous plaudits speak no uncertain sound (applause); they come from the lips of men who were loyal to our country (applause). and they assure me that I am to night before ladies and gentlemen who steod by our country in its dark and trying hour, when the cloud of war hung over the land; and it assures me that as they felt an interest then in its welfare, they are determined to be consulted in the settlement of that conflict.

I might better come, my friends, to-might and take a coal from the fires that are burning upon your altars and apply it to human lips, than expect, by aught that I can say, to interest or guide you along the rugged oathway of duty in the present crisis. I am surrounded here tonight by the loyal 'League of Pennsylvania' (applause), whose deeds and whose acrotion to our common country are themes of praise upon every loyal lip. (Applause) I remember well, but a little more than two years since, I spent that memorable Sabbath with you which succeeded that terrible conflict at Gettysourg, painful yet gratifying in its results. (Applause.)

When you strip the issues of the present hour of extraneous questions, you reduce 1 to a simple proposition, which can be stated in a very few words; and it is a proposition presented to us of Executive usurpation neon the one hand and Congressional legislation upon the o her. (Applause.) I know well that there are many collateral issues and questions that arise. When you take them news, it is reduced to a single question of executive ordinances and legislative question of executive ordinances and legislative enactments, and it is my purpose, in the sug-postions which I shall make, to look at the con-lition of things.
