A few minutes after 8 o'clock, the late Vice-President appeared, and was greeted with the most enthusiastic applause.

I am grateful, very grateful, for the position that enables me to introduce to this fair and beautiful audience, beautiful because it is fair,

These generous plaudits speak no uncertain sound (applause); they come from the lips of men who were loyal to our country (applause).

I might better come, my friends, to-night and take a coal from the fires that are burning upon your altars and apply it to human lips,

We have now arrived at that point where you yourselves—the people of the country—are to determine upon what terms and upon what conditions those who succeed to destroy this

In the name of three hundred thousand men who went down to patriotic graves by all the obligations that we owe to the loyal men in the South,

Have we not paid enough? My friends, have more than three hundred thousand men have gone down to patriotic graves for you and me and our friends.

Have we not contributed enough in the billions of money that we contributed from our treasury to demand that when the final settlement is made it shall be made upon terms and conditions that shall never be disturbed (applause).
