Anarchy Threatened THE Constitution of the United States, Artiele II, section 4, declares that "The President, Vice-President, and all civil officers of the United States shall be removed from office on impeachment for and conviction of treason, bribery, or other high crimes and misdemeanors." Article I, section 2, says :- "The Houselof Representatives shall have the sole power of impeachment."

Remember, reader, the entire capital of nearly every National Bank is invested in National United States bonds, which are deposited with the Government to get national bank notes for circulation, so national bank notes and green backs will become equally depreciated with backs will become equally depreciated with United States bonds.

The Republican party can be judged for the future by its past acts, and our only positive security is in sustaining it. Let all vote understandingly. If the author of this was confident the Southern Rebels and the Northern Copperheads would succeed in getting control of the National and State Governments, he would immediately sell his national bonds and bank stock, and advise his friends to do so.
