Baugh being duly sworn, deposes and says that, on the 8th day of October, 1866, he was appointed by the Judges of the Court of Common Pleas a return inspector for the Sixth Division of the Fourth Ward; that at twenty minutes before 7 e'clock A. M. of Tuesday, the oth of October, 1866, he was present at the polling place of said division, and presented his certificate of appointment by said Court to the judge of said election division, and requested to be sworn in as return inspector; the said judge, James Dillon, replied that said Baugh had no business there, and one Frank Finnigan, a constable of said word threatened. stable of said ward, threatenes said Baugh that, unless he left the table at which the votes were to be received he would arrest him (this deponent). This deponent refused to leave, asserting that he was an officer of the election, duly appointed by the court, and would remain inside of the polls unless he was put out by force. Whereupon Thomas J. Dagney seized this deponent by the arm and shoulder and forcibly ejected deponent from the room. This deponent further says that his appointment as return inspector as aforesaid has been treated with contempt by the election officers of the said division, and that he had no opportunity to per-form the duties for which he was appointed. The judge of the election (James Dillon) retained the certificate of this deponent. JACOB L. BAUGH.

DAVID BEITLER, Alderman. Yesterday morning the defendants, James Dillov, Francis Finnegan and Thos. J. Dagney were arraigned upon the charges specified in the affidavits, of assaulting Jacob L. Baugh, an election officer appointed by the Court of Common Pleas of the county of Philadelphia, October 8, 1866, as return inspector for the Sixth Division of the Fourth Ward, forcibly ejecting said Baugh from the room in which election officers met for the purpose of conducting general election October 9, 1866, and preventing said Baugh from discharging his duties as an election officer. Defendants waived a hearing and were held in \$600 bail each to answer at Court.

THE AUCTION SEASON. - The week of which to-day is the close has been a noteworthy one in dry goods auction sales. Messrs, Furness, Briniey & Co. closed up last night a twodays' sale of cloths, Lupin's merinoes, delaines and bombazines, poplins, dress goods, and ribbons, the net proceeds of which will amount to more than three hundred thousand dollars. The sale was remarkable for the very fine character of its offerings. At least five eighths of all the goods presented were adapted to Chesnut street and Froadway first-class retail trade. Cloaking, cloths, silks, velvets, and shawls were thus given to the trade, without reserve, that only at intervals come under the hammer. We observed among the buyers many prominent men in the trade from Baltimore, New York, Pittsburg, and Cincinnati.

The sale of the cloths occupied the first day. The goods brought full prices, which, as they could not be duplicated, and as the styles were of the very best, was or course to be expected. The double-width cloaking and coating cassi-meres brought from nine dollars per yard downwards. The dress goods and ribbons were sold vesterday, both sales progressing at the same time upon different floors, Mr. Joshua Ash and Mr. Brinley coincidently doing duty as auctioneers. The sale was a spieudid one. The representative of Messrs. Benkard & Hutton, the importers of the goods, was present, and at the close of the sale publicly thanked the auction firm for the business-like manner in which they had performed what was certainly two days stupendous work.
