#### THE PARAGUAYAN WAR.

Grand Preparations for a General Assault on Fort Humatta-Lopez to be Crushed

at Once, Etc. RIO JANEIRO, September 7.—On the 12th of August a conjectence was held on board the Apa, flagship of Admiral Tamandare, at anchor in front of Passo de la Patria. The officials present were Minister Octaviano, Viscount de Tamandare, Baron Porto Alegre, and Marshal Polydoro. The utmost ceremony attended their movements, all being present in full uniform. This meeting lasted several hours at the headquarters of Marshal Polydoro, and it was resolved that the Paraguayans should be attacked simultaneously by the mole of the allied forces, land as well as naval. The plan of attack is based upon studies of the position made by Marshal Polydoro, and which had received the supportand sanction of his Brazilian colleagues, Porto Alegre and Tamandare. Fort Curupatti is to be first attacked by the squadron and reduced, so as to uncover the right wing of the Paraguayan army, which is to be attacked by the second corps of the allied army, while the first corps moves against this centre and the Argentine against the left wing. Great activity was observable in the allied camp. All the sick and wounded were being hubried to Cerrientes, and all officers on furlough were called upon to immediately take their places in the field. It was expected at Buenos Ayres that, before the 1st of September, important events should have taken place on the Parana. Still, the sluggishness of Tamandare may spoil the whole plan. Polydoro is busy re-organizing the whole Brazilian force, and in this has adopted the course usually pursued in

European armies.
On the 26th Minister Octaviano was to take leave of the army at Preso de la Patria, and it was expected that during the following week a forward merch would take place. All kinds of ridiculous rumors about Lopez and his move-ments are transmitted from the allied camp, and the testupony of certain deserters is given as proof of the weakness of the Paraguayan army and of Lepez's intention to fall back on a strong position afforded by a river in the rear of Humaita.

Minister Octaviano is expected at Buenos Ayres to confer with the Arrentine Govern-ment in relation to the Peruvian and Bolivian protests against the secret treaty of alliance of May 1, 1865. The Buenes Ayres and Rio Janeuro papers are circulating reports that Chili will not associate herself with Peru and Bolivia in their protests, but will remain neutral during the Paraguayan conflict; but well informed ones regard these reports as mere ruses de guerre.

In Bushos Avres the House of Delegates has passed a bill authorizing the issue of \$4,000,000 worth of bomds bearing nine per cent, interest, and to be secured by an additional duty of five per cent, on imports and two per cent, on exports. Thus you see to what straits the war puts Buenos Ayres. - N. Y. Herald.
