MEETING OF THE HOMOEOPATHIC SOCIETY.—The last session of this association was held on Thursday evening, at the College, in Filbert street, Dr. Richard Gardner, the President, being in the chair.
A report from the Cholera Committee indicated that it had held itself ready for prompt action during the summer and fall epidemics of cholera, had demanded it. At present no further action on the part of the committee was needed, no cholera hospitals having been established by the city authorities, nor any district cholera physicians having been appointed. Some discussion ensued on the subject of cholera itself, and the influence that the eating of such food as produces an increase in the number of cases of the disease.
Dr. W. Williamson then read an able and instructive article on the cause, phenomena, and homeopathic treatment of intermittent fever.

REVENUE CASES.—William Murphy and Edward O'Gorman were before United States Commissioner Smith yesterday, on the charge of carrying on the business of distilling without a license. Defendants were arrested on the complaint of Henry A. McCallum, Deputy Collector of the Second District, who made a seizure of the distillery at a few days ago.
Mr. McCallum testified to the seizure and the fact that distilling was going on at the time. William S. Kneass also testified to seizure, and to some resistance on the part of the defendant, O'Gorman. The accused were held for trial.

ACCIDENTS.—James Simons, a lad, was run over by a milk wagon yesterday while crossing Frank and Vine streets, and had one of his legs fractured. John Mullopp fell from a scaffold at Germantown yesterday, and was seriously injured. The practice of throwing apple-parings on the footways is one so likely to be attended with injury to pedestrians, that it ought not to be continued. A lady, while walking in front of the Custom House yesterday, was thrown down by one, and was injured.
DEATH OF A POLICEMAN.—Policeman Daniel Culp, of the Fourth District, died at his residence, in Germantown, on Thursday, of congestion of the lungs. Deceased was formerly a High Constable of the borough of Germantown, but had been appointed on the police force of the city by Mayor Conrad. He was fifty-three years old.

HAND CRUSHED.—John Luby, nineteen years of age, had his hand badly crushed yesterday afternoon between two freight cars, at West Philadelphia. It is thought that amputation will be necessary. He was taken to the Pennsylvania Hospital.
