There has been a great number of forgeries perpetrated in our great cities within the past few months. The successful efforts of this combination have bad the effect to put the banking institutions on the alert, and through the agency of private detectives they have succeeded in securing the conviction of several offenders. It is no information to the public to state that these parties (as generally every thief does) assumed different names when arrested, and, in most cases, their real names would not have been discovered and known but for the knowledge had of them by the detectives. The most recent case is that of a resident of this city, who, when arrested in Chicago, gave the name of Steele, and by that name was indicted and tried, we believe.
