[ For Additional City Intelligence see Fifth Page.] MEETING OF THE MOYAMENSING SOUP SOCIETY.—There was a very interesting meeting of the contributors of the Moyamensing Soup Society last evening. The Treasurer's report shows that from the opening, on the 8th of January, until the closing, March 10, there were given out 190 gallons of soup daily. The Managers issued 400 teckets, supplying 532 adults and 776 children with food. The supplies purchased by the committee were 4723 lbs. of beef, 52 bushels of potatoes, 5 bbis. of flour, 3 do, of onions, 117 bushels of peas and beans, 200 lbs. of barley, 100 heads of cabbage, and 80 bushels of turnips. During the season 4454 lbs. of bread were distributed, besides 4200 fbs. of Indian meal. The report states that there was a continued demand upon the Managers which they were unable fully to supply, owing to the want of increased facilities in the manuscture of soup.
