THE MEXICAN QUESTION.

Important Cabinet Conference Thereou.

Napoleon Asks Until January to Withdraw His Troops.

Our Government Demands Immediate Withdrawal.

WASHINGTON, October 23 .- The attitude of this Government towards Mexico, and the condition of affairs in that country as previously communicated to you, is fully confirmed. The French Government have asked for a delay of the time for the withdrawal of the first instalment of their troops until the 1st of January, with the promise that if this time is granted it will waive the time allowed for the removal of the remain-ing detachments, and remove all substantially at one time. To this our Government has not assented, but insists that the withdrawat shall commence at once, and proceed as vigorously as possible. It is more than hoped that the whole body of French troops will leave Mexican soil

within three months.

In view of the possibility of disturbances the country and the anarchy arising from the numerous factions and cliques that have for so long cursed that land, our Government will be prepared to protect the recognized republican Government of Juarez, and establish it on a firm and secure footing. In consideration of these services, the cession of Lower Cali-fornia and the northern portions of the States of Sinaloa and Chihuahua is made to the United States. It is no part of the agreement yet made that the United States is to guarantee the claims of France against Mexico, though such a course may yet appear expedient and proper, in which case the Government of this country will not hesitate to take the responsibility.

The main point sought is to enforce the Monroe doctrine by removing European intervention from Mexican affairs, and securing to that country a stable republican form of gov-ernment. The responsibility of this under-taking has been fully discussed by the Cabinet, and the decision has been unanimously arrived at that the time has come for the energetic action indicated in the proceedings above foreshadowed. These proceedings have now taken definite form and shape, and have entered so far in to prosecution as to be beyond recall.

Col. Campbell, the Minister to Mexico. The statement printed to-day in a New York paper that Colonel Campbell, Minister by appointment to Mexico, has not received his instructions, is altogether untrue. These instructions were prepared on Saturday last, but as Colonel Campbell did not arrive in town until Sunday, they were not delivered to him until to-day. He now has them, but is doubtful it. in justice to himself, he can depart for Mexico immediately, as required by the instructions. Colonel Campbell has been a very heavy loser

by the recent floods near Cincinnati, and his own terests demand his presence there at this time. He has this evening asked the President to grant him leave to remain here long enough to hix up his personal affairs. It is understood that the President's reply is that the urgency of the case relay, and that if Colonel Campbell cannot depart at once, another Minister must be appointed in his place. ABOLITION IN SPAIN,

Royal Decree Liberaling Colored Slaves

Visiting Old Spain—Sales of Colored
Persons Forbidden. The Gazeta de Madrid publishes the following

In conformity with the plan laid down by my Colonial Minister, and after consultation with my Council of State, I decree as follows:—

Article 1. Article 2. Persons of color who are slaves shall no longer be list to the pains of imprisonment, at han labor, in our penal colonies abroad, Por to sales, as heretofore. Slaves who may have committed crimes, and against whom sentence to hard labor may have been pro-nounced, together with imprisonment and its usual consequences, shall fulfil the term of their sentence in the islands of Cuba and Porto

Article 3. Should advantage be taken of the emancipation and freedom secured by the first article by persons coming to the peninsula and its adjacent isles for the purpose of avoiding judgments pronounced against them by the tribunals of Cuba and Porto Rico, where the tribunals of Cuba and Porto Rico, where the said persons were slaves, process may be here entered against said persons for the whole or any portion of the indemnity that would have been covered by their sale at public auction in the afore-mentioned islands. But such indemnity shall never exceed the sum that such sale at auction would have realized.
