The consideration of the ordinance was postponed, and it was ordered to be printed.

Mr. Miller, of the Highway Committee, reported resolutions providing for the grading of Courtland street, from Broad street to Old York road, and Juniata avenue, from Fifteenth street to Old York road, and for the paving of portions of Sixteenth, Twenty-second, Beach, and Cavin streets, all of which were adopted.

Mr. Taylor, of the Committee on Markets, reported an ordinance prohibiting any occupant of any stall or stand in the market-houses to cook or sell cooked victoria or affer the
